- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: So
- 4 before we -- before we before we start, Mr. Chenoweth,
- 5 you can lead Mr. Houghton's evidence. We'll follow
- 6 the same procedure we followed the last time and
- 7 otherwise generally keep the order of cross-
- 8 examination the same. You'll re-examine rather than
- 9 cross-examine, since you'll be leading evidence-in-
- 10 chief. Anyway, Commission counsel have one final right
- 11 of re-examination.
- 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I'm quite
- 13 content with that, Your Honour.
- Just while we're dealing with other
- 15 matters, I have raised with Inquiry counsel the
- 16 prospect of calling an additional witness who is an
- 17 expert witness. I just mention that I'm hoping to
- 18 hear from Inquiry counsel today so I might make
- 19 arrangements to -- to get --
- 20 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: This
- 21 is --
- 22 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: -- that
- 23 witness --
- 24 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: This
- 25 is John Scott, Mr. Chenoweth?

6 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Yes, sir, it 1 2 is. 3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: You -you can call him. I -- I think it's more efficient if -- if you lead the evidence from him because we would have to interview him and so on, and I don't want to -- I don't want to delay matters. You've obviously -you've obviously interviewed him --9 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I have. 10 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: -- and 11 filed this report. So we'll -- we'll - we'll follow procedure, the same procedure with your witness, Mr. 13 John Scott, as we're following with Mr. Houghton. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I'm quite 15 content, Your Honour. Thank you. 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: The next witness is Marjory Leonard. 17 18 19 (BRIEF PAUSE) 20 21 MARJORY LEONARD, Sworn 22 23 EXAMINATION-IN-CHIEF BY MS. KATE MCGRANN: 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Good morning, Ms. 25 Leonard.

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Good morning.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: To begin, would you
- 3 please provide us with a brief overview of your
- 4 education and work experience.
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I have a
- 6 Bachelor's Degree of Administration from the
- 7 University of Ottawa, a Master's of Business
- 8 Administration from York University, I am a CPA/CMA,
- 9 and up until this year I also held a Certified
- 10 Financial Planner's designation -- or licence. I'm
- 11 getting ready to retire so I didn't renew
- I worked for a chartered accounting
- 13 firm for twenty-seven and a half (27 1/2) years doing
- 14 compilations; review engagements; audits; a lot of
- 15 computer work; assisting clients with selections of
- 16 systems, and training people on those systems;
- 17 corporate, personal, and estate tax returns;
- 18 procedural reviews for clients to develop internal
- 19 controls; and I started at the Town in 2005 as the
- 20 Treasurer.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: With reference to
- 22 2012, which is the time frame that we're looking at,
- 23 would you provide us with an overview of your role and
- 24 responsibilities as Treasurer for the Town?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I was

- 1 responsible for the financial integrity of the
- 2 Corporation. I oversaw the budget process. Actually
- 3 I was very integral in the budget process at that
- 4 time. We were in the process of implementing a job
- 5 costing system, which I oversaw as well, the payables,
- 6 receivables, tax revenues, to a certain degree the
- 7 purchasing functions, day-to-day accounting.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm going to ask
- 9 that you be shown in paragraph 15 of the Foundation
- 10 Document.

12 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Paragraph 15
- 15 describes the bylaw to provide for the purchasing of
- 16 goods and services that was in place in 2012 in
- 17 particular.
- 18 Did you receive any training on this
- 19 bylaw when it was introduced or -- or before 2012?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In -- one (1) of
- 21 the first tasks when I first started in 2005 was to
- 22 continue on with the preparation of the purchasing
- 23 bylaw that had been started by the -- the prior
- 24 treasurer, and that when we were ready to bring this
- 25 bylaw to Council, we had the lawyer that wrote the

- 1 bylaw come and provide direction to -- to Council and
- 2 department head staff at that time during a Council
- 3 meeting. So that would be the -- the training.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: In 2012, who did
- 5 you understand was responsible for overseeing the
- 6 administration of this bylaw?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In terms of this
- 8 bylaw, the -- I believe it was the Purchasing Manager
- 9 that was responsible for ensuring that the policies,
- 10 procedures, and bylaw were in -- in accordance with
- 11 the directives that were in that bylaw.
- 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And what was the
- 13 basis for that understanding?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe it --
- 15 for -- for me it was the definition of Purchasing
- 16 Manager.
- 17 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What definition are
- 18 you referring to?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: If you turn to
- 20 the bylaw, there is a definition in there of
- 21 Purchasing Manager, which I believe, in terms of my
- 22 job description, I was to oversee the preparation of
- 23 the policies and the procedures and guidelines, and
- 24 monitor -- evaluate the systems itself and monitor the
- 25 procurement options. But I believe that from the

- 1 definition of the Purchasing Manager, to ensure that
- 2 these policies and guidelines were adhered to, became
- 3 the Purchasing Manager's responsibility.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: It's our
- 5 understanding that Mr. McNalty was -- held the
- 6 position of Manager, Fleet Facilities and Purchasing.
- 7 Is that the role that you're referring
- 8 to when you say the Purchasing Manager --
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- is responsible?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes. But if I
- 12 may add, up until the time we hired Mr. McNalty, the
- 13 department head would be assigned as the Purchasing
- 14 Manager.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: So the department
- 16 head in charge of the department --
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- that was making
- 19 the purchase?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Your understanding
- 22 that that -- that person was responsible for the
- 23 administration of the -- the purchasing bylaw with
- 24 respect to the purchases that they were making?
- 25 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct.

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                   MS. KATE MCGRANN: And it's your
   understanding that once Mr. McNalty was retained, he
   then took over that responsibility?

                   MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could scroll
24 down so you can see a little bit more of paragraph 15
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here, first of all with perspective to subparagraph

- 1 (a).
- 2 This paragraph describes a provision in
- 3 the bylaw which says:
- 4 "Department heads shall ensure that
- 5 all provisions of the bylaw are
- 6 complied with."
- 7 Is that what you were referring to when
- 8 you said that prior to Mr. McNalty's taking on the
- 9 role -- department heads were in charge of ensuring
- 10 the bylaw was complied with?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Partly, but if
- 12 you do look at the definition section of Bylaw 2006-
- 13 42, it does say that in the absence of a Purchasing
- 14 Manager, the department head would fulfill that role
- 15 as well.
- 16
- 17 (BRIEF PAUSE)
- 18
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Looking at
- 20 subparagraph (b), which describes a different
- 21 provision in the purchasing bylaw:
- "Purchases over 50,000 shall be
- obtained by tender."
- Were you aware of that requirement in
- 25 2012?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was your
- 3 understanding of the reason for that requirement?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was to ensure
- 5 a -- a competitive process was undertaken for the
- 6 larger purchases that we made at the time, in terms of
- 7 vehicle purchases, sewer works, those types of things.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And what was your
- 9 understanding as to why a competitive process was
- 10 required for -- for purchases along those lines or for
- 11 any purchases over fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000)?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: To ensure the
- 13 best value for the taxpayer.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you receive any
- 15 training prior to Council's decision to construct the
- 16 Sprung buildings on the competitive tender
- 17 requirements of the bylaw or the sole-source
- 18 provisions of the bylaw?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: As I said, when
- 20 the lawyer that actually wrote the bylaw for us
- 21 presented to Council, that was the amount of training
- 22 that we were given on the bylaw itself.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. And within
- 24 that training, do you remember receiving any
- 25 information about the requirements to take purchases

- 1 over fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to tender or
- 2 where it was permissible for the Town's to proceed by
- 3 way of sole source?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: There actually
- 5 was a section in that bylaw that -- that talks about
- 6 sole sourcing at that time. It was, in general -- and
- 7 I believe that the prior purchasing bylaw had also
- 8 used these two (2) dollar amounts. I can't -- again,
- 9 I -- I -- it's a long time ago for that, but I believe
- 10 that the fifty thousand (50,000) and the twenty-five
- 11 thousand dollars (\$25,000) were the same as they were
- 12 in the initial bylaw, before 2006.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you receive any
- 14 training on where it was appropriate or allowable for
- 15 the Town to proceed by way of sole source?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The -- there --
- 17 as I say, there is a section in that bylaw that does
- 18 talk about the sole source when it's a unique product,
- 19 there's only one (1) known source, timeliness. In --
- 20 in general if -- if -- if I'm -- for instance, we have
- 21 a water plant that uses a patented technology called
- 22 ZeeWeed, and that decision was made in 2000 -- 19 --
- 23 the late 1990s, and we're tied to that type of
- 24 product to continue to update our water plant with.
- So in situations like that, where

- 1 decisions have been made in the past that may affect
- 2 what we're going to do now, we can sole source some of
- 3 those types of things.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. I think
- 5 you've given me some information about your
- 6 understanding of when sole sourcing is appropriate.
- 7 I'm going to ask you a couple more questions about
- 8 that in just one (1) minute.
- 9 My question for you right now is: Did
- 10 you receive any training on the sole-source provisions
- 11 of the bylaw, any explanation as to when sole sourcing
- 12 would be appropriate?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I believe
- 14 we did in 2006, but that's a long time ago now, so.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I understand that
- 16 it was a long time ago.
- Do you remember anything about the
- 18 training that you received on the sole-source
- 19 provisions of the bylaw?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I'd have to say
- 21 no.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: You've explained to
- 23 us that you understood in 2012 that Mr. McNalty in his
- 24 role of Manager of Fleet Facilities and Purchasing was
- 25 responsible for the administration of the purchasing

- 1 bylaw.
- 2 Did you understand that you had any
- 3 role with respect to the administration of the
- 4 purchasing bylaw?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It -- it would
- 6 have been in -- in the evaluation of it, finding -- if
- 7 there were any areas that needed to be tightened up,
- 8 those types of things, and to the extent that I could
- 9 monitor the activities of the departments in terms of
- 10 the purchasing, that was also my responsibility, and
- 11 the vast majority -- virtually all of the monitoring
- 12 occurred when I was signing cheques, because I -- it
- 13 was after the fact always.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. When you say
- 15 that you would monitor where possible and that your
- 16 monitoring was -- generally involved signing cheques,
- 17 can you explain to me what you -- what you mean by
- 18 "monitoring"?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In terms of --
- 20 when I would be signing the cheques I would find
- 21 instances where, for instance, a department head would
- 22 want to code half a tractor to this account because it
- 23 had budget and the other half of it to this account
- 24 because it had budget, which was a total step around
- 25 the intent of the purchasing bylaw itself. There were

- 1 other instances where -- actually there was a
- 2 discussion at department heads where we had uncovered
- 3 an -- an unforseen expense. I think at that time it
- 4 was roughly thirty-two thousand dollars (\$32,000) and
- 5 I said, you mean I have to bring that back to Council,
- 6 because it was more than the twenty-five (25)? Those
- 7 types of things in terms of monitoring.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Is it the case that
- 9 department heads were required to bring purchases to
- 10 you before a commitment to make the purchase had been
- 11 made?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 13 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Were there any
- 14 instances in which department heads were required to
- 15 bring purchases to you before the commitment to
- 16 purchase had been made?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: With that
- 19 understanding then, it's unclear to me what monitoring
- 20 you could do other than ensuring that the accounting
- 21 for commitment to purchase had already been made were
- 22 -- were taken care of properly.
- 23 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It -- it was
- 24 very difficult to monitor a situation where the person
- 25 that was in charge of the process didn't report to me.

- In terms of the monitoring, as I say, I
- 2 will -- I -- I could only deal with it after the fact.
- 3 I couldn't be -- unless I knew about it, I couldn't be
- 4 proactive.
- 5 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I -- I
- 6 take it you would have articulated this to people as -
- 7 as time went on?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I probably
- 9 most likely did, Your Honour. Maybe not --
- 10 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO:
- 11 "Probably most likely did" sounds to me like you did
- 12 repeatedly.
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 14 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Thank
- 15 you.

- 17 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you receive
- 19 responses to the concerns that you raised that
- 20 addressed your concerns?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I do remember
- 22 one (1) time I was invited to a meeting to discuss the
- 23 south servicing reservoir project. I hadn't been here
- 24 very long and one (1) of the provisions in the
- 25 contract that they wanted to sign had the third

- 1 parties that were front-ending the agreement having
- 2 final say over the construction and who was awarded
- 3 the tender. And I voiced at that meeting that that
- 4 was in contradiction of the bylaw itself and I never
- 5 got invited back.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said that
- 7 meeting took place shortly after you joined, so we're
- 8 looking shortly after 2005 or 2006?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, I believe
- 10 it was -- it was shortly after this bylaw was passed,
- 11 so it would have been late 2006 or early 2007 when
- 12 they were getting ready to construct the reservoir for
- 13 South Servicing.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall
- 15 raising any concerns about your ability to monitor, or
- 16 your lack of ability to monitor in the period between
- 17 2010 and August 2012?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: For a great deal
- 19 of that time I was off sick for the better part of
- 20 sixteen (16) months, so the opportunity really did not
- 21 arise.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: I have a couple
- 23 more questions for you about people's roles with
- 24 respect to the administration of the -- the purchasing
- 25 bylaw.

- 1 And so I'd like to turn next to your
- 2 job description, which is at TOC600352.
- 3 This document is undated, but it has
- 4 been produced to the Inquiry as the job description
- 5 for the treasurer that was in effect in 2012. I'll
- 6 give you an opportunity to -- to scroll through this,
- 7 but my first question is: Had you seen this document
- 8 in 2012?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I saw this
- 10 document when I was first hired in 2005 and we didn't
- 11 revise job descriptions until we went through the pay
- 12 equity, job equity, and compensation review, which
- 13 was, I believe, 2013.
- 14 So I did see it when I first started,
- 15 yes.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Was this the kind
- 17 of document that was brought to your attention on a
- 18 regular basis as part of performance reviews or
- 19 otherwise?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If you go to page
- 22 2, I just want to bring your attention to paragraph 9.
- 23 This paragraph states that one of the responsibilities
- 24 of the treasurer is:
- 25 "To oversee the development and the

Transcript Date October 15, 2019 21 administration of the corporate 1 2 purchasing function, including 3 recommendation of purchasing procedures and tendering processes, evaluation and revision of same as 5 6 appropriate and monitoring the implementation and administration of purchasing policies." What was your understanding of how this 9 aspect of your job description applied to you as in 10 11 2012? 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Initially the -the -- oversee the development and administration of 13 the corporate purchasing function, that part of it was 14 15 technically out of my hands because I didn't -- the purchasing function didn't report to me. 17 In terms of what was produced when we 18 first approved the bylaw, the lawyer provided us with 19 a template, RFP, real property acquisition guideline, unsolicited proposals guideline, and a large portion, 20 if not all, of the tendering procedures and other 21 quidelines were actually contained in that bylaw 22 23 itself at that time. 24 Evaluation and revision of those

processes, if I found them, and we actually -- there

- 1 was one (1) area that would have been updated. The
- 2 bylaw should have been looked at every five (5) years,
- 3 and -- and again I was not there.
- 4 But there was one (1) spot in that
- 5 bylaw that says it's -- it was talking about getting
- 6 quotes if available. And I can't remember if the
- 7 number was two (2) or three (3), but there is one (1)
- 8 part in there, and that was one (1) area that needed
- 9 to be revised.
- 10 In terms of monitoring the
- 11 implementation and administration of the purchasing
- 12 policies, again, the only type of monitoring that I
- 13 could do was when I was looking at the payments that
- 14 were going out and trying to -- to determine -- the
- 15 bylaw itself also said that you had to do purchase
- 16 orders.
- 17 That was something that was only really
- 18 followed by one (1) person in the organization. I
- 19 couldn't -- we provided them at that point in time it
- 20 was the old printed numbered purchase orders and
- 21 nobody would fill -- nobody would provide them back.
- So in terms of did you get three (3)
- 23 quotes, I couldn't -- I couldn't tell. I could ask
- 24 and the answer would be "yes" or it would be "no," and
- 25 that was basically all I could really do.

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1 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: But
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- 2 that'd be -- you'd be asking after they'd made some
- 3 sort of commitment to the supplier. You really
- 4 wouldn't have much choice, except to pay the -- to pay
- 5 the bill even in the example you gave, the thirty-two
- 6 thousand dollars (\$32,000,) it -- Council doesn't
- 7 really have much choice, legally, the -- the liability
- 8 has been incurred by somebody who is capable of
- 9 incurring it. You've got to pay it.
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Your Honour,
- 11 that's correct.

- 13 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than the
- 15 example that you gave us of the meeting that you
- 16 attended in 2000 -- late 2006, early 2007, where you
- 17 raised concerns about the purchasing bylaw and as a
- 18 result you felt you were not invited back to any other
- 19 meetings, can you tell us did you attempt to -- to
- 20 address the limitations you saw and your ability to
- 21 oversee the purchasing bylaw at any point before 2012?
- 22 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 23 so.
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Mr. McNalty came
- 25 and gave evidence before the Inquiry and his evidence

- 1 was that he understood that the treasurer and the CAO
- 2 were responsible for compliance with the purchasing
- 3 bylaw.
- When Mr. McNalty was brought on in that
- 5 role of manager, fleet facilities and purchasing,
- 6 first of all it's my understanding that he was the
- 7 first person to -- to fill that role, that was a new
- 8 role that was introduced when he was hired.
- 9 Is that right?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Were any steps
- 12 taken to introduce that role to staff, introduce
- 13 staff's functions as they interacted with that role
- 14 they had, can you tell us what -- what was done in
- 15 that respect to help people understand what he was to
- 16 do and how staff was to work with him?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall
- 18 if any of that was done. I don't recall.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What is your
- 20 reaction to his evidence that he understood that the -
- 21 the treasurer and the CAO were responsible for
- 22 compliance with the purchasing bylaw?
- 23 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I again refer to
- 24 the -- the definition of the purchasing manager in
- 25 that bylaw. And I would say that he -- the purchasing

- 1 manager owned the process.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm not going to
- 3 take you to the provision and ask you to interpret it.
- To your knowledge, was anyone ever told
- 5 that Mr. McNalty was the purchasing manager as defined
- 6 in the bylaw?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'll turn now from
- 9 general questions about the purchasing bylaw to a few
- 10 more questions about sole source procurements.
- 11 Prior to the recreation facilities,
- 12 what experience did you have with sole source
- 13 procurements?
- 14 You've already talked about the water
- 15 treatment plant and the -- the patent that applied to
- 16 purchases made there. More generally, what was your
- 17 understanding about when sole source procuring was --
- 18 was permissible?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: My general
- 20 understanding was that, if it was the only product out
- 21 there known to -- to fulfill the need, if it was an
- 22 integral component of something that we already owned
- 23 and it might have, you know, did the warranty,
- 24 undermine the warranty that we would have had on other
- 25 parts of that facility item, whatever, that there was

- 1 a timed sensitive nature to it, for instance, the --
- 2 the ZeeWeed membranes.
- 3 We would have to keep the water plant
- 4 up and running. And I think that sums up.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: With respect to the
- 6 notion that if there was a time sensitive aspect to
- 7 the -- to the purchase, you mentioned the ZeeWeed
- 8 membrane; that's for water purification for the Town.
- 9 That suggests to me as sort of an
- 10 emergency situation. We need to provide the Town with
- 11 clean drinking water. When you talk about time
- 12 sensitivity coming into play and looking at a sole
- 13 source procurement, what do you mean by, "time
- 14 sensitivity?"
- 15 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It would be

- 2 Did this termination affect how you
- 3 went about the work that you were doing for the Town?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I performed my
- 5 duties as I always would. However, it was always in
- 6 the back of my mind that it could happen to any one
- 7 (1) of us.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: When you say it was
- 9 always in the back of your mind, do you mean that
- 10 that's a thought that you had had since you joined the
- 11 Town as treasurer in 2005, or is that a thought that
- 12 entered your mind at a later time?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It entered it at
- 14 a later time.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. When did you
- 16 start having that thought in the back of your mind?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When they --
- 18 they did dismiss the CAO at the time.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I understand that
- 20 you said that you went about your -- your duties as
- 21 always, but this was something that was in the back of
- 22 your mind.
- 23 Did you -- did you hold back from
- 24 raising concerns or comments at any point in time as a
- 25 result of the fact that this thought was in your mind?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I may have.
- 2 Yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Speaking generally,
- 4 can you think of any other ways that -- I mean, this
- 5 concern effected the way that you went about doing
- 6 your job?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: In terms of -- in
- 9 terms of you maybe not voicing concerns or comments
- 10 that you would have otherwise voiced, are there any
- 11 comments or concerns that you would have voiced in
- 12 respect of the Town's decision to proceed with Sprung
- 13 Structures, but for your concern?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I would
- 15 have requested more time to deal with the information
- 16 that was being collected.
- I could not see the urgency to get this
- 18 done in -- in a month, five (5) weeks. There was a
- 19 lot of information there. I didn't have the time to
- 20 vet the numbers that I did receive when I -- when I
- 21 received them. So I would have, you know, the time
- 22 constraint was just un -- unbelievable.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than voicing
- 24 concerns about the time constraints and asking for
- 25 more time, anything else that you would have raised

- 1 otherwise, had this concern not been in your mind?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I don't
- 3 know. I can't recall right at the moment for that,
- 4 but --
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said that you
- 6 didn't understand the urgency with respect to the --
- 7 the staff report and the timeline that you'd been
- 8 given.
- 9 Did you understand that there was an
- 10 urgency there though?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: With the -- the
- 12 pressure to get it done, yes.
- 13 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Where was the
- 14 pressure to get it done coming from?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Mostly from the
- 16 CAO.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: How was that
- 18 pressure communicated to you?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Virtually at
- 20 every executive management committee meeting we would
- 21 discuss something of that, and it would be -- you
- 22 know, it -- do you have a draft ready yet or that type
- 23 of thing.
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than the
- 25 communications at the EMC meetings, was the pressure

- 1 communicated to you in any other way?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When -- when I
- 3 was asked to send a copy of the staff report to the
- 4 deputy mayor, yes, then it was a little pressure then
- 5 because it was just a very rough draft that I had
- 6 provided to Ed at that point in time. So, the
- 7 pressure was on for that.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. And we'll
- 9 have some questions about the draft version and the
- 10 request that you -- that you pass it on to the deputy
- 11 mayor and things like that in a bit.
- 12 For now I just want to understand, at a
- 13 high level, where you felt the pressure coming from
- 14 other than the EMC meetings, the request that you send
- 15 your early draft to the deputy mayor, any other ways
- 16 that you recall feeling pressure communicated to you
- 17 with respect to the staff report from the CAO?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That the dead --
- 19 the deadline date was we had to have it ready for --
- 20 for distribution to Council for the 23rd, I believe,
- 21 the agendas went out on the Thursday. And also, I was
- 22 getting ready to start the budget process at that
- 23 point in time, so there was pressure coming from all
- 24 sides at that time.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay, so your --

- 1 your other job responsibilities were --
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Trying to
- 3 interfere, yes.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than from the
- 5 CAO, did you feel pressure coming from anybody else
- 6 with respect to the staff report?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not that I can
- 8 recall.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I want to ask you
- 10 some questions about the Executive Management
- 11 Committee, which is referred to in the Foundation
- 12 Document as the EMC.
- 13 First of all, what was your reaction to
- 14 the appointment of Mr. Houghton as acting CAO for the
- 15 Town?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I was a
- 17 little surprised. He had -- he was the CEO of the
- 18 hydro company, the water company, and the executive
- 19 director of public works. It would have seemed a
- 20 little stretched to make him the -- to make him CAO as
- 21 well.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than being
- 23 surprised because of his already heavy workload, any
- 24 other reaction to his appointment as acting CAO?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not that I can

- 1 recall.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Were staff given
- 3 any information about how long Mr. Houghton was
- 4 expected to serve in the role of acting CAO when he
- 5 was appointed?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall
- 7 any.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We see that in and
- 9 around the time that Mr. Houghton is appointed as
- 10 acting CAO, the Executive Management Committee is
- 11 formed. How did you come to be a member of that
- 12 committee?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Mr. Houghton
- 14 asked me.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did he explain to
- 16 you what your role in the committee would be when he
- 17 asked you to join?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: As an advisory -
- 19 member of an advisory team to the CAO.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you understand
- 21 that you had a specific role or specific
- 22 responsibilities on the EMC?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Just to assist
- 24 Mr. Houghton in carrying out those duties. When we
- 25 look at it, Ms. Almas and I were the two (2) signing

- 1 officers for the corporation, so it kind of made sense
- 2 that perhaps we should sit at that committee level.
- 3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: This
- 4 was an advisory role though, not a decision-making
- 5 role, as far as you understood?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct,
- 7 Your Honour.

- 9 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can you explain to
- 11 us how the EMC functioned? How did it go about
- 12 performing its advisory role?
- 13 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: We would have
- 14 meetings, in the beginning it wasn't too often, but
- 15 then it became more formalized and definitely on a
- 16 weekly basis, and that items would be discussed and we
- 17 would have a -- a consensus on the outcome of the
- 18 direction.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who identified the
- 20 items for discussion at the EMC meetings?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It could have
- 22 been any one (1) of us, if something that came up.
- 23 For instance, our HR manager, in -- in terms of I
- 24 mentioned the compensation review, pay equity review,
- 25 and job equity review. She brought those to me, I

- 1 raised them at the EMC and we were able to follow
- 2 through on -- on those items.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: So the EMC was
- 4 implemented as a -- a group to -- to act as an
- 5 advisory committee to the CAO.
- In practice, did your role involve more
- 7 than simply providing advice or you taking on
- 8 additional tasks? Were you acting as an interface
- 9 between the CAO and staff, for example?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In -- in certain
- 11 instances, yes.
- 12 In terms of taking on other tasks, with
- 13 -- with the termination of CAO Wingrove, she had
- 14 several items that were open and on the go that we
- 15 would pick up and -- and see through to the end.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: How was
- 17 responsibility for those items assigned?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It would be
- 19 raised at the committee and -- in terms of the ones
- 20 that -- that I got because I remember them, it would
- 21 be, you know, yeah, I'll take -- I'll clean that one
- 22 (1) up or I'll finish that one (1) or -- or that type
- 23 of thing.
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay, so members of
- 25 the committee would volunteer to take on certain

- 1 responsibilities that needed to be addressed?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You mentioned that
- 4 the EMC operated, on a consensus basis, what do you
- 5 mean by that?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That all four
- 7 (4) of us would -- would agree, you were free to voice
- 8 your opposition and if the rationale was there, you
- 9 could change your mind or that type of thing.
- 10 But it was a -- normally a -- a
- 11 consensus agreement. However, the CAO did have -- did
- 12 hold the -- the cards in the game. He had the right
- 13 to veto or assign tasks in any way.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. In the
- 15 group, how would you know when consensus had been
- 16 reached?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was usually
- 18 the CAO that would restate what had been said around
- 19 the table and everybody would agree.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Ms. Almas,
- 21 when she appeared before the Inquiry, gave evidence
- 22 that the EMC operated on a no-objection basis. Is
- 23 that --
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yeah, on -- no
- 25 objection. I tended to -- I tended to be a little

- 1 more outspoken, but if the rationale was there, I
- 2 could be -- not persuaded, but I could have my mind
- 3 changed, I could change my mind if I saw the rationale
- 4 from the other members of the committee.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. In your --
- 6 in your experience on the EMC, were you also capable
- 7 of changing the minds of the other members?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I can't
- 9 think of an instance when that happened, but I'm sure
- 10 that I -- if the opportunity was there, if the
- 11 rationale could be provided to persuade or change the
- 12 direction of the action.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm going to turn
- 14 now to --
- 15 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Just
- 16 before you do that. I'm just a little bit -- I'd like
- 17 a little bit of a clarification.
- 18 The consensus was -- was it a consensus
- 19 around the advice that you were giving the CAO, or was
- 20 it a -- a decision to do something?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was -- it --
- 22 technically it was both. There was certain instances
- 23 where that -- the advice to the CAO was what we all
- 24 agreed on and in terms of his -- as I mentioned, about
- 25 the HR manager's request, that was a decision that we

- 1 all came to that we -- we all agreed that, yes, we
- 2 need to get on with this.
- 3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: And
- 4 the -- the difficulty I'm having is it's very easy to
- 5 go from this consensus arrangement to a -- an
- 6 arrangement where you were actually making a decision
- 7 and -- which has the force and effect of a decision
- 8 that was being made by the CAO, in which case the
- 9 responsibilities of the CAO have been divested upon or
- 10 distributed to the committee versus a situation where
- 11 you're saying, look, our advice is that you should do
- 12 this. So to my mind they're different.
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: To -- to you,
- 14 Your Honour.
- I agree with you in that case, in --
- 16 and I'm just -- it -- it was I guess in terms of the
- 17 HR manager, that was my advice to him, is that we
- 18 should go ahead with this, and the decision ultimately
- 19 would have been his, "yes" or "no."
- 20 But the other two (2) members of the
- 21 committee we all agreed on it, so I -- I don't know if
- 22 I've answered you, sir.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well
- 24 enough.
- 2.5

- 1 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: You had indicated a
- 3 little bit earlier this morning that any member of the
- 4 EMC could -- could bring up an issue for the EMC to
- 5 deal with.
- 6 You're there as an advisory committee.
- 7 Is it the case that Mr. Houghton came to you with
- 8 questions upon which he was seeking advice?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I would say
- 10 yes. But at that -- at that time there were several
- 11 things that we were looking at, like the items that
- 12 had to be cleared up after Ms. Wingrove's departure.
- 13 Again, I'm getting ready for the budget
- 14 and there are other things that were going on, the
- 15 lottery, Ontario Lottery and Gaming and in general
- 16 those types of things.
- 17 So he would come and -- and present
- 18 issues or -- or items that he wanted us to look at or
- 19 discuss.
- 20 And again, we -- if there was something
- 21 that -- because of the diversity of his whole
- 22 portfolio, there were things that would come to Sara
- 23 or myself or -- or Larry that would be brought up at
- 24 the meeting, as well.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can we turn up

1 paragraph 129 of the Foundation Document?

2

3 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm going to turn
- 6 to some more specific questions about your involvement
- 7 in things leading towards the staff report August
- 8 27th, 2012.
- 9 This paragraph describes an email that
- 10 Mr. Houghton sent to Council and department heads
- 11 about a strategic planning session that was scheduled
- 12 for June 11th, 2012.
- 13 If we could scroll down. In his email,
- 14 Mr. Houghton writes that he would start the scu --
- 15 session by -- scroll up a little bit -- explaining the
- 16 workshops, goals, and objectives, Ms. Proctor would
- 17 provide a detailed summary of the work completed to
- 18 date and that you would provide a very brief look at
- 19 funding options which will include money already
- 20 identified, the money from the Collus PowerStream
- 21 partnership, funding opportunities, and debenture
- 22 costs.
- So, turn to that paragraph for context.
- 24 Do you remember this strategic planning session taking
- 25 place?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't have a
- 2 clear memory of the planning session itself.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Stepping back then
- 4 for a second. At this point in time, the Collus share
- 5 sale has not yet been -- has not closed yet, but
- 6 information about that share sale is available.
- 7 What did you understand your role was
- 8 going to be regarding the administration of the Collus
- 9 share sale proceeds?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Council had
- 11 pledged or promised or directed that there be a public
- 12 consultation in terms of where these funds would be
- 13 spent or utilized.
- 14 That's what my -- my understanding was,
- 15 that we would be having either a survey or several,
- 16 you know, roundtable public meetings in order for the
- 17 -- the public to get their ideas on the table.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 19 at this point in time, so June of 2012, if you had
- 20 been consulted about how the funds should be used?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: We see that you are
- 23 going to provide a brief look at funding options,
- 24 including money from Collus PowerStream.
- 25 Do you recall whose idea it was that

- 1 information about the Collus PowerStream funds be
- 2 included in an information session or a strategic
- 3 planning session about the recreation facilities?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 6 whether it was your idea?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I do not.

8

9 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Were you ever asked
- 12 before Council made a decision about how it was going
- 13 to use the funds to provide advice or opinions or
- 14 recommendations about the best use of those funds for
- 15 the Town?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In terms of the
- 17 best use of those funds for the Town, no. I was asked
- 18 to review the -- the survey results that we did do,
- 19 place those in front of Council and do an analysis of
- 20 some of the options that we had initially put out
- 21 there.
- 22 And I -- as a staff person, I would not
- 23 recommend to Council what the use of those funds would
- 24 be. It would be up to Council to determine which of
- 25 the options they -- they wanted.

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We saw in part 1 of
- 2 the Inquiry which looked at the process leading to the
- 3 sale of the Town's shares in Collus that Council voted
- 4 to enter into a strategic partnership that
- 5 contemplated joint growth through the acquisition of
- 6 interests in other LDC companies.
- 7 Were you ever asked to consider the
- 8 financial implications of participating in that growth
- 9 for the Town?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I was not.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we turn back to
- 12 the -- the email on the screen, come back to the --
- 13 the June 11th strategic planning session, Mr.
- 14 Houghton's email indicated that you would provide:
- "...a brief look at funding options,
- 16 including funding opportunities and
- 17 debenture costs."
- Do you remember doing any work in
- 19 advance of the June 11th strategic planning meeting to
- 20 identify potential funding opportunities for the
- 21 Town's recreation facilities?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I do recall
- 23 doing some debenture costing and calculations for Ms.
- 24 Proctor when we were dealing with the steering
- 25 committee's report.

- 1 At that time, I don't believe there
- 2 were any funding opportunities for MURFs out there, so
- 3 it would mostly have been the debenture costing.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. And just for
- 5 context, this is a strategic planning session in which
- 6 Council are asked to voice ideas other than a multi-
- 7 use recreational facility for the Town.
- 8 Do you recall if you or anybody else
- 9 looked at potential funding opportunities for
- 10 recreation facilities more generally in advance of
- 11 this session?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I did not.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Were you -- to your
- 14 knowledge, did anybody else?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not to my
- 16 knowledge. But I would assume that Ms. Proctor had
- 17 looked at the funding options since she had been
- 18 involved in that -- the steering committee. And if
- 19 there were any out there, they would have -- if it was
- 20 recreation facilities, would have been applicable to
- 21 the ones that Council alternatively might want to
- 22 build.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And do you recall
- 24 having any discussions with Ms. Proctor before this
- 25 session or at all before August 27th about potential

- 19 discussion like this at the department head meeting on
- 20 July 17th?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- 22 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Stepping away from
- 23 the date for a second, do you remember a discussion
- 24 about needing clarity from Council about the direction
- 25 it wants to go more generally?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall if
- 3 there was any confusion amongst staff as to the
- 4 direction that had been provided at the July 16th
- 5 Council meeting?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I would --
- 7 no, I don't really recall that, but I would assume
- 8 that the one (1) that had the most confusion would
- 9 have been Ms. Proctor.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And why do you say
- 11 that?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The direction
- 13 that we received to enclose the outdoor with a fabric
- 14 building and look at building a single pad arena that
- 15 could be phased is fairly clear in my mind.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall if
- 17 there were any discussions about the time line that
- 18 had been set for staff by Council at this meeting?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 21 being involved in any discussions about the time line
- 22 more generally with other members of staff or the CAO?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes. I -- I
- 24 believe it was voiced that it -- it was pretty tight.
- 25 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What can you tell

- 1 us about discussions about the time line being pretty
- 2 tight?
- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: There were a lot
- 4 of items that we needed to get costed in order to
- 5 provide, in my mind, full information for Council to
- 6 make a decision in terms of which direction they
- 7 wanted to go, whether it was bricks and mortar or pre-
- 8 engineered steel or a fabric building in terms of the
- 9 arena.
- I felt that those three (3) items would
- 11 be the harder components to make a comparison for
- 12 Council to make a decision on the outdoor pool or the
- 13 fabric building. To me it would have been the more
- 14 straightforward of the two (2) because the direction
- 15 was clearly a fabric building. Just provide the
- 16 specifications and go out for an RFP to meet the
- 17 fabric building component.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 19 being involved in any discussions about the tightness
- 20 of the time line in light of the concerns that you
- 21 identified there?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 23 Marta and I may have had some discussions about it.
- 24 She was tasked with -- her and her staff were tasked
- 25 with the -- determining the interior components that

- 1 you would need for an arena and the pool, and as well
- 2 the operating costs for both of those entities.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. What do you
- 4 remember about the conversations you had with Ms.
- 5 Proctor about the tightness of the time line?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Well, the fact
- 7 that she was going to be on vacation for a good
- 8 portion of it, which kind of left her -- her staff to
- 9 -- to gather the information, and then she would come
- 10 back to take a look at it, and that -- because she was
- 11 going to be away, that controlling those aspects would
- 12 be a little difficult.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 14 discussions with her about seeking an extension of the
- 15 time line so that she could have more time outside of
- 16 her vacation to work on the staff report?
- 17 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 18 so.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 20 discussions with anyone about your own concerns about
- 21 the tightness of the time line?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe if I
- 23 spoke to anyone it would have been Ms. Almas because
- 24 we were in the same building and closer.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember any

- 1 discussions with Ms. Almas about concerns about the
- 2 tightness of the time line?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Is there any reason
- 5 that you didn't take those concerns to the CAO?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: If -- I don't
- 7 recall actually if I did or did not, and he -- pretend
- 8 he was -- his philosophy was to meet Council
- 9 deadlines, you know, put it that way.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: How did you come to
- 11 understand that that was his philosophy?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Just from his
- 13 past experience and, you know, push the -- pressure to
- 14 get this item done and out of the way.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Was it the case
- 16 that you did not think that he would ask for extra
- 17 time if you asked for extra time?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did that play into
- 20 any discussions that you may or may not have had with
- 21 him about needing extra time?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: But --
- 24 but it would be pointless to ask him for extra time if
- 25 you thought that his preoccupation with meeting

- 1 Council deadlines would override it anyway.
- Is that what you thought?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, Your
- 4 Honour.

- 6 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who managed and
- 8 oversaw the work that staff was doing on the staff
- 9 report?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The CAO.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: How did he come to
- 12 be the person who was managing that work?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The departed
- 14 head -- department head, Marta, would have been off
- 15 for approximately five (5) of the six (6) or seven (7)
- 16 weeks that we had, and somebody had to step in. He
- 17 took that task as his own.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I suppose the other
- 19 option would have been to -- to ask for an extension
- 20 to the deadline for the department head, who had taken
- 21 vacation and could do that job?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would agree
- 23 with that statement.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: So Mr. Houghton
- 25 takes on the management of the staff report.

- 1 What did that look like? What did he
- 2 do to manage the staff report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Basically I
- 4 would -- I did write a draft and I provided it to him
- 5 and other members of the EMC for comment, and I
- 6 received comments back and made changes and sent out
- 7 another iteration of the report as to where I could,
- 8 you know, make changes. There were a lot of holes.
- 9 It was very difficult to get numbers. I didn't
- 10 actually get a lot of numbers, and I just wrote words
- 11 around it, I guess is what I would say.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Who else was
- 13 working on the staff report other than you?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: To my knowledge,
- 15 I was the one (1) that was working on the, quote,
- 16 "staff report." The other departments or the other
- 17 staff members were working on gathering the numbers to
- 18 be plugged into the staff report and doing the
- 19 research and those types of things.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Who was
- 21 involved in gathering the information that you needed
- 22 in order to draft the staff report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Dave McNalty was
- 24 looking at the external building structures, the
- 25 various types of those components, and Darin Potts and

- 1 Dennis Seymour, two (2) of Marta's staff members, were
- 2 looking at getting the operating costs for those
- 3 facilities as well as looking at -- well, we did have
- 4 a report on the condition assessment for the Eddie
- 5 Bush, so those costs were -- were somewhat known at
- 6 that time.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Was anybody else
- 8 involved, to your knowledge, in gathering the
- 9 information required for you to draft the staff
- 10 report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I think the only
- 12 person would have been Ed, the CAO himself.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And what did you
- 14 understand that he was doing to gather information for
- 15 you to draft the staff report?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: He -- he was the
- 17 one (1) that was in contact with Sprung.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who assigned Mr.
- 19 McNalty to the work that he was doing for the staff
- 20 report?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The CAO.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And how did you
- 23 come to understand what Mr. McNalty had been tasked to
- 24 do for the staff report?
- 25 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that

- 1 it was to look at -- because he had been involved in
- 2 part of the Central Park Steering Committee's research
- 3 in terms of dealing with the architects there and the
- 4 types of -- the various types of buildings that --
- 5 that were out there, that it was logical for him to
- 6 continue on with that in terms of the new direction.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Who did he
- 8 report back to on the work that he was doing on the
- 9 building structures?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The CAO.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who assigned Mr.
- 12 Potts and Mr. Seymour to look at the operating costs?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 14 was Marta.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And who did you
- 16 understand they were reporting back to?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Marta.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And how was the
- 19 information that they gathered to be communicated to
- 20 you?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It would have
- 22 come through Marta to me. We would have -- that
- 23 information we would have -- Marta and I would have
- 24 discussed to make sure that the assumptions -- that
- 25 they -- the staff members had used were -- were valid

- 1 and that those numbers were collected a -- a lot
- 2 earlier than the building structure numbers that were
- 3 available.
- 4 So I know that Marta and I did have
- 5 time to discuss them.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: With respect to
- 7 operating costs, what are you describing there?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The costs of,
- 9 basically the heat, hydro, repairs and maintenance,
- 10 those types of things. The fixed costs of those
- 11 buildings and to -- to allow -- because we -- we had -
- 12 we had never had an indoor pool, so in order to
- 13 determine the increase in the operating costs, Marta's
- 14 staff went out and researched with other
- 15 municipalities that had at least a full-time indoor
- 16 pool and hopefully that some of them were roughly the
- 17 same size as the -- the 25 metre pool that we were
- 18 going to enclose.
- 19 So it was just basically the increase
- 20 in the operating costs from an outdoor pool to an
- 21 indoor pool. We probably had enough historical
- 22 information, based on the Eddie Bush, to determine the
- 23 costings on an arena, regardless of the -- the type of
- 24 structure. The only thing that would have been
- 25 different in there is the type of or the quantity of -

- 1 of heating and -- and those other types, electricity
- 2 and -- and those types of utility costs.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay, so when you
- 4 say "operating costs," you're referring to the costs
- 5 that get the building up and running and keep it in --
- 6 keep it in serviceable shape so that people can come
- 7 and use it?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Correct.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Would that have
- 10 included the costs of staff needed to run the building
- 11 as well?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No. The staff
- 13 numbers would have been -- excuse me, the --
- 14 regardless -- well, for the pool, yes, because we only
- 15 had the part-time staff and they directed that it be a
- 16 fabric cover over it.
- In terms of the arena, when you're
- 18 looking at bricks and mortar or pre-engineering steel
- 19 or a fabric building, the number of employees would
- 20 have been the same. I -- I would assume that the --
- 21 the number of staff members would have been the same.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 23 anyone turned their minds to -- I understand that the
- 24 staff numbers would be the same number -- what the
- 25 construction type of the arena is, but presumably

- 1 there may be a need for additional employees if you
- 2 open a new arena.
- 3 Was that something that was taken into
- 4 consideration?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that -
- 6 let me think for a minute.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay.
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The -- I -- the
- 9 actual increase in -- in the staff were in part-time
- 10 and casual.
- 11 The same number of staff at Eddie Bush
- 12 were rotated and allocated so that the main operating
- 13 type of employees, the total number stayed the same.
- 14 But presumably there should have been a -- a doubling
- 15 or at least an extra three (3) or four (4) people to
- 16 run those arenas if they'd been 24/7 ice rinks.
- 17 And at that point in time, Eddie Bush
- 18 still was a 24/7 ice rink and this new pool would have
- 19 been -- would have -- or the new pool. The new arena
- 20 was to become the 24/7 ice rink and Eddie Bush was
- 21 going to become just a -- a winter rink. So it was
- 22 kind of difficult somewhat to -- to determine those.
- 23 But yes, there would have been a -- a
- 24 small increase in the staff.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Turning back to who

- 1 was doing what with respect to the work that was being
- 2 done to get you information that you needed to draft
- 3 the staff report, so Ms. Proctor is directing Mr.
- 4 Potts and Mr. Seymour on getting the operating costs,
- 5 they're reporting back to her.
- 6 Did she have any other role in
- 7 collecting the information that you needed or
- 8 otherwise working towards the -- the staff report?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 10 she did have some involvement with Mr. McNalty in
- 11 determining bricks and mortar and trying to get the
- 12 numbers, and I believe it was from WGD as well. She
- 13 had the contact with them for the steering committee.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And we've heard
- 15 evidence about her vacation from you and others.
- 16 Do you know who determined the extent
- 17 of her involvement in the work being done towards the
- 18 staff report?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I would
- 20 assume it was the CAO.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said that Mr.
- 22 Houghton was in contact with Sprung. What did you
- 23 understand the purpose of his contact with Sprung was
- 24 for the work you were doing on the staff report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: To just get a --

- 1 a costing, an estimated costing or a -- a fabric
- 2 building. Had I known that those numbers had already
- 3 been supplied, it would have been a different
- 4 thought.
- 5 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: What
- 6 would you have thought if you had known the numbers
- 7 had already been supplied?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would have
- 9 taken those numbers and put them in the report and
- 10 said, you know, like you don't -- no more negotiation
- 11 on this, we go with these numbers and Council can
- 12 determine which needs more investigation than just the
- 13 -- put your hands up and vote for it.

- 15 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said that Mr.
- 17 McNalty was doing the work to get the costing for the
- 18 exterior building structures.
- 19 If he was doing that, why did Mr.
- 20 Houghton need to speak to a supplier of a building
- 21 structure to get numbers on top of what Mr. McNalty
- 22 was doing?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- at one
- 24 point, and I don't recall which point, the CAO did
- 25 indicate that he was the -- the sole contact with

- 1 Sprung, and I believe that also came out in Mr.
- 2 Dabrus' testimony last week, that basically Ed was the
- 3 only one that was going to be in contact with Sprung.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember --
- 5 how did you learn that -- that Mr. Houghton was to be
- 6 the only contact with Sprung?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall,
- 8 but I -- in the Foundation Documents I did see the
- 9 email that he sent to Dave, so I would assume that it
- 10 was Dave that relayed that.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You don't recall.
- 12 Is it the case that you do remember knowing that Mr.
- 13 Houghton was to be the only contact with Sprung at the
- 14 time?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Are -- could you
- 16 repeat that one?
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: You don't recall
- 18 how you learned that Mr. Houghton was to be the only
- 19 contact.
- Is it the case that that's something
- 21 that you knew at the time, though, in the time that
- 22 you were working towards the draft staff report, did
- 23 you know that Mr. Houghton was to be the only contact
- 24 person with Sprung?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.

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1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
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- 2 you had any conversations with him about that?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Were
- 5 you told why that was the case?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 7 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Was
- 8 there any question about how Council had come to the
- 9 decision to cover the pool with a fabric building in
- 10 the absence of any investigation?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 12 so, Your Honour.
- 13
- 14 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall
- 16 having any conversations with anyone about the fact
- 17 that Mr. Houghton had been designated as the only
- 18 person to contact Sprung?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall
- 20 any.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Before we get into
- 22 some more detailed questions about the work that you
- 23 did in drafting the staff report, I just want to put a
- 24 couple of -- of things that Ms. Proctor said in
- 25 evidence to you and get your reaction to them.

- 1 So, we've already talked about the
- 2 timeline, conversations that you had with her about
- 3 the timeline. In her evidence, Ms. Proctor said that
- 4 she spoke to the EMC about her concerns about the
- 5 timeline for the report, and that it was too short and
- 6 that she was told that she wasn't being a team player.
- 7 Do you recall any conversations like
- 8 that?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't
- 10 recall any conversations like that.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Ms. Proctor also
- 12 gave evidence that in discussions that she had where
- 13 she was trying to ensure that the Town's recreation
- 14 facility decisions were being made transparently, she
- 15 was told that in response to her suggestions that's
- 16 not how things are done in Collingwood.
- 17 Do you recall any conversations like
- 18 that?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Finally, in her
- 21 evidence Ms. Proctor said that she felt that there
- 22 were conversations and directions being given about
- 23 the recreation facilities that didn't come from
- 24 Council as a whole, that the -- the conversations and
- 25 directions were happening behind the scenes and they

- 1 were being funnelled through the EMC to staff.
- What's your reaction to that evidence?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Well, I would --
- 4 I would say that I would agree with the fact that
- 5 there probably were conversations outside of Marta.
- 6 I'm not -- I would not agree with the fact that it was
- 7 at the EMC level and -- and being funnelled back
- 8 through to staff.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What conversations
- 10 are you referring to?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would -- after
- 12 having read the Foundation Document in -- in hindsight
- 13 there were a lot of back and forth with the Deputy
- 14 Mayor and the CAO.
- 15 And I believe that the answers were
- 16 coming out, the direction was coming out through the
- 17 CAO.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Leaving aside the
- 19 Foundation Document and what you know today, stepping
- 20 back to what you were aware of during the time that
- 21 you were working towards the staff report, did you
- 22 have an understanding that directions were being
- 23 provided with respect to the work that staff was doing
- 24 outside of meetings of Council?
- 25 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When I received

- 1 the email to forward the staff report to the Deputy
- 2 Mayor, yes.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm going to turn
- 4 now to the request that was made of you to share a
- 5 draft of the staff report with the Deputy Mayor and --
- 6 and his involvement more generally.
- 7 When Mr. Rick Lloyd gave evidence in
- 8 the Inquiry, he said he was consulted many times on
- 9 the contents of the staff report.
- 10 Did you ever seek out his assistance or
- 11 ask him any questions on your work on the staff
- 12 report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: So if you could
- 15 turn to paragraph 336 of the Foundation Document,
- 16 paragraph 338 of the Foundation Document.
- 17 This paragraph describes an email that
- 18 Mr. Houghton sent to you on August 19th, 2012, in his
- 19 email he's forwarding a chain, but in his email he
- 20 writes:
- 21 "Take a look at this, I'm not --
- Ms. Leonard, sorry, I'm going to start
- 23 again. This paragraph describes an email that Mr.
- 24 Houghton sent to Deputy Mayor Rick Lloyd. He's
- 25 forwarding an email that you sent to him.

- In his email to Deputy Mayor Rick
- 2 Lloyd, Mr. Houghton says:
- 3 "Take a look at this, I'm not read
- it, but will. I'm going to ask
- 5 Marjory to flip it to you as well."
- 6 If you could scroll down. Take a look
- 7 at the email, it's at TOC517810. Scroll to the
- 8 bottom. Scroll up. So we can see that this is an
- 9 email that you sent to Mr. Houghton, Mr. Irwin, and
- 10 Ms. Almas, Ms. Proctor, and Mr. McNalty, draft number
- 11 1, the Centennial Central Park staff report.
- Do you recall sending around the first
- 13 draft of the staff report? You sent it at 10:30 on a
- 14 Saturday.
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Were you
- 17 aware at the time that you circulated that draft that
- 18 a copy was going to be provided to the Deputy Mayor?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: I think that you've
- 21 covered this, but just to be clear, had you had any
- 22 discussions with the Deputy Mayor about the work you
- 23 were doing on the staff report prior to circulating
- 24 this draft?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Before I ask you a
- 2 couple of more questions about his involvement, at
- 3 this point in time, you've completed your first draft.
- 4 Had you ever been put in charge of
- 5 drafting a staff report with respect to construction
- 6 projects that the Town was considering undertaking
- 7 before?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: At this point in
- 10 time, did you feel that you had the resources
- 11 available to you to draft the staff report that you
- 12 were working on?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believed that
- 14 I could wordsmith the document. In terms of providing
- 15 the background information and research for it, no, I
- 16 could not. But once I had that information, I felt
- 17 that I could lay it out in a way that Council would
- 18 have all the information and have them make the
- 19 decision as to which way they wanted to go.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. So, it
- 21 sounds like you're envisioning that Council's going to
- 22 be provided with information about the various options
- 23 that they asked for information about.
- 24 Did you foresee that staff would be
- 25 making a recommendation as to which option Council

- 1 should pursue?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 4 understanding as to why you had been tasked with the
- 5 drafting of this staff report?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Again, no, I
- 7 didn't. It was -- other than the fact that Marta was
- 8 going to be off on vacation. And I -- I assumed that
- 9 I'd be getting to do some further analysis on numbers
- 10 that were provided to give Council the full
- 11 information they needed.
- 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What kind of
- 13 analysis did you envision doing on the numbers that
- 14 were provided?
- 15 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would have
- 16 provided just a flat -- made -- made sure that they
- 17 had all of the information regarding to, this is the
- 18 fabric structure, one (1) type, and this is the
- 19 potential operating cost for that -- that type. We
- 20 should go out to RFP. These are the specifications if
- 21 we go out to RFP, and have the developers or the
- 22 product manufacturers bring in a proposal in terms of
- 23 the other three (3), the bricks and mortar, pre-
- 24 engineered steel, and a fabric over the pool.
- I would have provided them with the

- 1 costs and, you know, used those as -- it would have
- 2 been a little more difficult to -- to do an RFP on
- 3 them, but I would have provided them with potential
- 4 funding options and the increases in the operating
- 5 costs in regard to taxes and those types of things.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. A couple
- 7 things. First of all, you said with respect to bricks
- 8 and mortar, pre-eng steel and a fabric building over
- 9 the pool. Were you referring to the options for the
- 10 arena?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yeah, the arena.
- 12 Yes, the arena.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said it would
- 14 be a little bit more difficult to take that to RFP.
- 15 What do you mean by that?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't really
- 17 know how -- how -- we -- we would have had to, I
- 18 believe, hire a consultant, an architect, an engineer
- 19 or something able to compare all of those various
- 20 options.
- 21 I -- I know nothing about them. I'm
- 22 sure there are -- positive that there are pros and
- 23 cons to each type of structure, but I'm not the one to
- 24 judge those. I -- I don't know.
- So, I would assume that we would have

- 1 gone and -- and gotten a consultant to assist with
- 2 drafting an RFP to even go to market to be able to
- 3 compare those three (3) different structures.
- 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: And
- 5 that's essentially what they did with Collus Power,
- 6 was get KPMG to assist in the RFP. Did you envision
- 7 something similar to that?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, Your
- 9 Honour.
- 10 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Do --
- 11 before you leave this document, 0517810, I just want
- 12 to take you back. You forward the draft to Mr.
- 13 Houghton, Mr. Irwin, Ms. Almas, Ms. Proctor, and Mr.
- 14 McNalty.
- They're the staff people that are --
- 16 you're working with to prepare --
- 17 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's right.
- 18 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: -- the
- 19 report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct,
- 21 Your Honour.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: And --
- 23 and you're asking them to review the draft? You want
- 24 their comments?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct.

- 1 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: And
- 2 would they do that by way of track changes on it, or
- 3 would they just email you the comments, and then you
- 4 would incorporate them into the document?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In -- it could
- 6 happen either way, sir.
- 7 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Okay.

MARJORY LEONARD: No, I -- I don't 19 recall. 20 2.1 (BRIEF PAUSE) 22 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And I think we've 24 covered this, but just to be clear, do you recall 25 receiving any comments from him whatsoever before the

- 1 report was finalized?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe

- 19 licensee, if -- if you will, on their construction
- 20 methods and -- and projects.

- 22 you got that information from?
- 23 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't know if
- 24 it was -- if it was directly stated in that manner,
- $25\,$ but for -- for sure that's the impression that I -- I

- 1 left that meeting with.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Tom Lloyd of Sprung
- 3 has appeared as a witness at the Inquiry, and one (1)
- 4 of the things that he said in his evidence was that he
- 5 told Mr. Houghton that the Town didn't have to use BLT
- 6 to construct the pool and arena buildings.
- 7 Were you aware, before Council voted on
- 8 August 27th, that the Town didn't have to use BLT?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I was not.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Mr. McNalty, I've
- 11 mentioned to you already, appeared and gave evidence
- 12 to the Inquiry as well. One (1) of the things that --
- 13 that he said was that he understood that it was
- 14 possible to build a Sprung structure without using a
- 15 design build contract.
- 16 What did you understand about what the
- 17 Town's options were as far as building a Sprung
- 18 structure and what kind of construction contract the

- 17 some information about what was discussed at this
- 18 meeting, but can you just tell us, what do you recall
- 19 being discussed at this meeting with Sprung and BLT?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Other than what
- 21 I -- what I mentioned, I don't recall.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 23 there was any understanding as to what next steps
- 24 would be, as between the Town, Sprung, and BLT at the

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't
- 2 recall.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if

- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I think I
- 14 first became aware of it in the Foundation Document,
- 15 actually.

- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could look at
- 20 paragraph 280 of the Foundation Document. This
- 21 paragraph describes that Mr. Houghton scheduled a
- 22 meeting for July 31st at 1:30 p.m. in his office with
- 23 the EMC, Mr. McNalty, and Mr. Seymour.
- 24 I recognize that this was quite a while
- 25 ago, but to you remember attending this meeting?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, I do.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 3 what the purpose of this meeting was?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 5 this meeting was to determine some of the
- 6 specifications required for an arena and a pool in
- 7 terms of things like dressing rooms and -- and change
- 8 rooms and those types of things, what -- what you
- 9 would need to open a pool and arena, the seating, the
- 10 benches, whatever.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 12 what was discussed at this meeting?
- 13 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 14 it -- it was the specifications for the seating and
- 15 whether we wanted coin operated heaters above the
- 16 benches in the arena itself. Those types of things.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 18 information or experience that would allow you to
- 19 contribute to the discussions about what kind of
- 20 things you would need in an arena or pool?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you understand
- 23 what the purpose of your attendance at this meeting
- 24 was?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, other than

- 1 to make sure that we had a -- a list of what we needed
- 2 and I could figure out how to pay for it.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you understand
- 4 what the purpose of generating the list was? How was
- 5 that list going to be used?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In my mind the
- 7 list was going to be used to perform the
- 8 specifications for an RFP.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I think I have
- 10 under -- I think I understood your evidence to be, but
- 11 I want to make sure that I've got this clear, any work
- 12 that was going to be done on putting together an RFP
- 13 for the construction of a pool and arena, did you
- 14 foresee that work being done before or after the
- 15 August 27th Council meeting?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: After.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you ask any
- 18 questions about why you were taking steps towards
- 19 information for an RFP at this point in time, when
- 20 Council hasn't directed staff to put one together?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Through --
- 22 through the research portion of it, like if you're
- 23 going to have an arena, we needed to know all of the
- 24 costs, we needed to know all the cost of -- of the
- 25 pool.

I -- again, as I said, I don't know how

- 2 many change rooms are needed, how many dressing rooms
- 3 for the hockey or, if there's a referee's whatever.
- 4 So, to gather information as to what
- would have been put in to specification was important
- 6 to me to -- to get that information down, even though
- 7 Council hadn't given us direction, I believe that it
- 8 would have been important to have that.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Council had
- 10 directed staff to come back with estimates for the
- 11 different building constructions that they had
- 12 identified.
- Did you think that the specifications
- 14 that you put together in this meeting were going to be
- 15 used to help get those estimates put together?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, I did.
- 17 MS. KATE MCGRANN: With respect to the
- 18 pool enclosure, who did you understand was working on
- 19 getting information about the pool enclosure?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was between
- 21 the CAO and Dave McNalty, but mostly it would have
- 22 been Dave McNalty.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: To your knowledge,
- 24 what did Mr. Houghton and Mr. McNalty do to research
- 25 information about a pool enclosure, a fabric building

- 1 pool enclosure?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I know that Mr.
- 3 McNalty had done some research in terms of -- with the
- 4 Central Park Steering Committee on fabric structures.
- 5 But in terms of who else they looked at or where else
- 6 they went, that I had no knowledge of.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said that you
- 8 know that Mr. McNalty had done some work with the
- 9 Central Park Steering Committee on fabric structures?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe it was
- 11 researching one (1) of those types of structures
- 12 somewhere. It may have been for the outdoor rink, I'm
- 13 not 100 percent sure on that.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What sort of
- 15 research work product did Mr. McNalty provide to you
- 16 with respect to the pool?
- 17 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 18 that he provided me with anything in terms of the
- 19 pool. It was -- it was actually through Ed with the
- 20 pricing on the contract that we eventually received.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay, and are you
- 22 referring to the budget that Sprung provided for --
- 23 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That -- that's
- 24 correct, yes.
- 25 MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- constructing a

- 1 building over the pool?
- 2 Do you know if anyone looked into any
- 3 other kinds of fabric buildings or suppliers of fabric
- 4 buildings for the pool building before the August 27th
- 5 Council meeting?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can tell you
- 7 that, when I heard about the Sprung and the fabric
- 8 buildings, I did go to the internet and -- basically
- 9 to determine whether or not there were competitors,
- 10 and I did turn up two (2) of them.
- 11 But in terms of what the other members
- 12 were doing, I don't know if it was just straight to
- 13 the internet. At that time, I didn't know if it was
- 14 just straight to the internet or if they had actually
- 15 contacted people from those other manufacturers that
- 16 were out there.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: So, through your
- 18 internet research you identified two (2) other
- 19 suppliers of fabric buildings?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe they
- 21 were Ye -- Yeadon and Norseman. Those are the two (2)
- 22 I remember.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember how
- 24 much time you spent doing internet research?
- 25 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe it was

- 1 a couple of hours anyway because I actually also went
- 2 out and looked up Sprung and their building code in
- 3 Ontario, specifications when they got to -- to build
- 4 in -- in Ontario.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: When you found
- 6 Yeadon and Norseman, what did you do with that
- 7 information?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's when it
- 9 was put into the staff report that you need to do an
- 10 RFP.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you reach out
- 12 to either of those companies to speak with anyone?
- 13 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 14 I assumed that that would have been done by the --
- 15 like, Dave McNalty or Ed, the people that knew more
- 16 about engineering and architecture than me.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 18 discussions with anyone on staff who was gathering
- 19 information for the staff report about what you found
- 20 through your research?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: But in light of
- 23 what you found, you incorporated the need for an RFP
- 24 into the draft of the staff reports you had --
- 25 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Correct.

117 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- put together? MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Correct. 2 3 (BRIEF PAUSE) 5 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: In terms of the work that was being done on the pool, to your 7 knowledge, did anyone on staff consult with any community stakeholders who had an interest in -- in aquatics in -- in the Town? 10 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Ye -- yes. 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. What can you 13 tell me about what you know about that? 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Again, it -- it 15 -- the -- the Clippers swim team in Collingwood had been part of the sterring committee, and their request was a 25-metre, six-lane pool. 17 18 I know that they did come forward and 19 indicate that they thought the idea was actually one (1) that they had had a few years before. They had 20 actually looked into covering the pool with some sort 21 of a fabric building, and $I \, -- \, I$ think it might have 22 23 been Sprung at the time. 24 But they were enthusiastic about if --2.5 if that was the direction that Council chose to go,

- 1 they were enthusiastic.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did the Clippers
- 3 come to you with this information?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know who
- 6 they went to?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe it was
- 8 either through the deputy mayor or Marta, or perhaps
- 9 even the CAO. I don't really know where that came
- 10 from.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 12 when you learned that the Clippers had spoken to
- 13 someone on staff about their support for covering the
- 14 pool?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't. I
- 16 don't remember.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 18 you learned of that before Council voted to proceed
- 19 with Sprung on August 27th?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't -- I
- 21 don't believe so. I don't believe so.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: All right. And
- 23 that answer may render this question redundant, but do
- 24 you remember if you received anything that the
- 25 Clippers had gathered in researching covering the

- 1 outdoor pool?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than the
- 4 Clippers, to your knowledge, did anyone on staff
- 5 consult any other stakeholders in the community who
- 6 had an interest in aquatics facilities before Council
- 7 voted to proceed with Sprung?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 9 so.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know if
- 11 anyone on staff took any steps to -- to look at
- 12 whether it was feasible to turn the existing outdoor
- 13 pool into an indoor pool?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 15 so. However, there was an abandoned project in
- 16 relation to the -- to the Heritage Park where they --
- 17 the intent was that we would build a therapeutic pool
- 18 there and a rehabilitation type centre. There was
- 19 going to be the wellness centre. And the indoor
- 20 therapeutic pool and the outdoor pool would share the
- 21 pumps and -- and all of those types of things.
- So, in -- in terms of covering the
- 23 outdoor pool itself, no, it had been another project
- 24 to go along with that, but it would have provided a
- 25 therapeutic pool.

1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. And just to

- 2 make sure that I understand, the wellness centre
- 3 concept involved the construction of a therapeutic
- 4 pool inside that would be able to use some of the
- 5 machinery that was being used by the outdoor
- 6 Centennial pool?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That was my
- 8 understanding.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know how
- 10 much, if any, work went into looking at whether that
- 11 kind of machinery sharing would be possible between an
- 12 indoor pool and an outdoor pool when the wellness
- 13 centre was being considered?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 15 we spent five hundred and some odd thousand dollars
- 16 (\$500,000) on engineering to determine whether or not
- 17 the wellness centre concept could be com -- completed
- 18 and what the servicing costs would be.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know whether
- 20 -- the question of whether that existing pool
- 21 machinery could be utilized continuing the outdoor
- 22 pool and servicing an indoor therapy pool, was that
- 23 part of the work the engineers did?
- 24 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I don't
- 25 fully know. But I do know that engineers did work on

- 1 it, so I -- I can't answer that question.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know if a
- 3 report was issued by the engineers who did that work?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That would be
- 5 during the period of time that I was off work, so I
- 6 don't know if there was a report.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: To your knowledge,
- 8 did any of the staff members who were working on
- 9 gathering information for the August 27th staff report
- 10 go back and look at the information that had been
- 11 gathered with respect to the wellness centre?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: When Mr. McNalty
- 14 came and gave evidence to the Inquiry he said he
- 15 wasn't sure if anyone assessed the feasibility of
- 16 putting a building over the pool and that the only
- 17 option considered for the pool was a Sprung structure.
- 18 Are you aware of anything additional
- 19 being done by staff with respect to the pool other
- 20 than the internet research that you've told us you
- 21 did?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.

23

24 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than the July
- 2 27th meeting, do you recall any -- attending any other
- 3 meetings with -- with Sprung?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not off the top
- 5 of my head.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If you look at
- 7 paragraph 291 of the Foundation Document -- 292,
- 8 actually, this paragraph describes calendar
- 9 information that Mr. Houghton sent for a meeting with
- 10 Sprung to members of the EMC, Mr. McNalty, Mr.
- 11 Seymour, Deputy Mayor Lloyd, and Tom Lloyd, from
- 12 Sprung. And the meeting is to take place on August
- 13 3rd, 2012.
- 14 Do you recall if you attended this
- 15 meeting?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I can't say
- 17 for sure if I did or not. There were a lot of
- 18 meetings going on.
- 19
- 20 (BRIEF PAUSE)
- 21
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 23 being present for a discussion about whether a Sprung
- 24 shield would be installed in either the arena or the
- 25 pool before Council made a decision to proceed on

- 1 August 27th?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe so,
- 3 yes.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What can you tell
- 5 us about that discussion?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When I -- when I
- 7 left the discussion, I thought that the Sprung shield
- 8 was going to be installed.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who was involved in
- 10 the discussion?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't
- 12 remember.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 14 anybody who was involved in the discussion?
- 15 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 16 Mr. Irwin was there and the CAO, Tom Lloyd I think for
- 17 sure.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 19 anybody else being present?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not that I can
- 21 recall.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 23 what was discussed about the Sprung shield?
- 24 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That it was
- 25 about an 8-foot high aluminum -- I don't know what you

- 1 call it -- panel that would go in the panels, and it
- 2 would make it a lot -- a lot less easy to break into
- 3 the -- to the building, or to damage the building.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 5 there was any discussion of the cost associated with
- 6 installing a Sprung shield in either the arena or the
- 7 pool?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't recall.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 10 anything else about what was discussed about the
- 11 Sprung shield with these individuals?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said when you
- 14 left the conversation you thought that the Sprung
- 15 shield was going to be installed. Why did you have
- 16 that understanding?
- 17 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I can't
- 18 answer that. I just thought that it -- it would have
- 19 -- it would have been installed. That's just the
- 20 impression that I came away from that meeting with. I
- 21 don't know when the decision to not put it in was
- 22 actually made.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Did you
- 24 understand as a result of that conversation that it
- 25 was something that the Town had to opt into, like,

- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not really, no.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Do you
- 8 remember being involved in any other meetings where
- 9 there were representatives of BLT present?

- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I can't. I
- 14 -- I do know I met Dave Barrow before August the 27th,

- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Leaving aside the

- 18 from Sprung other than at the -- the one (1) meeting
- 19 that you have told us about?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 22 discussions with anyone at BLT other than the one (1)
- 23 time that you met Mr. Barrow?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 25 MS. KATE MCGRANN: In terms of the

- 1 August 3rd meeting, Tom Lloyd, from Sprung, gave
- 2 evidence that that meeting was held because there
- 3 wasn't enough design information available from the
- 4 Town for Sprung to give the Town the information that
- 5 it was asking for.
- 6 Do you recall -- does that help jog
- 7 your memory as to the August 3rd meeting at all?

- 16 paragraph -- a couple more questions about August 3rd.
- 17 This paragraph describes that Mr. Irwin
- 18 sent Mr. MacNeil of Sprung, along with a copy to Mr.
- 19 Houghton, Mr. McNalty, and yourself, notes from
- 20 today's meeting, and that email that he sent attached
- 21 two (2) documents. They're scope of work documents,
- 22 which I will pull up so you can take a look at them.
- 23 My question is going to be: Do you
- 24 remember seeing this -- this email correspondence?
- 25 So let's take a look at TOC195145.

1 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: A couple of
- 5 background paragraphs. And if you scroll down further
- 6 you can see a list of design components.
- 7 So do you remember seeing a document
- 8 like this?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 11 receiving the email from Mr. Irwin, forwarding this
- 12 around?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Does seeing
- 15 this help -- help jog your memory about whether you
- 16 attended an August 3rd meeting or not?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, it doesn't.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall --
- 19 why did you receive this email from Mr. Irwin?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was -- it was
- 21 -- oh, it was results of the meeting that we had to
- 22 discuss the stuff that we needed inside of the pool
- 23 and the arena, okay, and that's the August 3rd
- 24 meeting. So he circulated it around to us so we could
- 25 see what we needed on the -- the inside and outside.

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. So, you had
- 2 told us that a July 30th meeting you attended, Mr.
- 3 Houghton's suggestion was to put together a list of
- 4 things that you needed for the inside of the pool and
- 5 the arena.
- 6 What we can see from the documents is
- 7 that on the morning of August 2nd, Mr. McNalty sends
- 8 around documents substantially similar to this to
- 9 members of staff. There's an August 3rd meeting and
- 10 then this -- this email is sent around after the fact.
- 11 What did you understand was being done
- 12 with this information?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In my mind, it
- 14 would be used to add to an RFP to say this is what we
- 15 want. We need two hundred and fifty (250) seats and -
- 16 to control the inside stuff that was going in it
- 17 basically.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you understand
- 19 that this information had been or would be provided to
- 20 Sprung to help it put together estimates?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't -- I
- 22 don't recollect that one.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. Do you
- 24 remember if you had an understanding of whether this
- 25 information had been or would be provided to WGD to

- 1 assist it in the work that it was doing?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Again, I don't
- 3 recollect.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm about to move
- 5 on to a new area. I'm looking at the clock. This
- 6 might be an appropriate time for lunch.
- 7 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: We'll
- 8 break for lunch until two o'clock.

- 10 --- Upon recessing at 12:54 p.m.
- 11 --- Upon resuming at 2:05 p.m.

- 13 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Good afternoon, Ms.
- 15 Leonard.
- 16 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Just a
- 17 second. Mr. Bonwick's not here. Does anybody know
- 18 where he is or --
- MR. GEORGE MARRON: Can't help you.
- 20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I've had no
- 21 contact with him, Your Honour.
- 22 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: All
- 23 right.
- 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I couldn't
- 25 say. Sorry.

- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well,
- 2 let me -- let me deal with something else first.
- 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Should I
- 4 step out for second and see if I can see him?
- 5 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well,
- 6 let me deal with this first and then we'll see. Maybe
- 7 he'll show up.

- 9 Mr. Bonwick. We -- we haven't taken any further
- 10 evidence since this morning. I was just about to deal
- 11 with the -- Mr. Scott.
- I -- I just want to say, Mr. Chenoweth,
- 13 I think the way we'll take his evidence is, lead his
- 14 qualifications and lead whatever it is he wants to
- 15 say. People can cross-examine on his qualifications

- 17 whatever arguments they want, either as to his qualifi

- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Good afternoon, Ms.
- 9 Leonard. Could we turn up TOC548961?

11 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 13 MS. KATE MCGRANN: These are the
- 14 minutes from a department head meeting on August 7th,
- 15 2012. Under the members, we can see that Mr. Houghton
- 16 is chairing this meeting. You're present, along with
- 17 others.
- 18 If we could scroll down to page 2.
- 19 Under heading number 3, "Staff Reports and Other
- 20 Business," if you look at the second -- third bullet
- 21 point, "Centennial Pool/Central Park," the minutes
- 22 state that:
- 23 "The Chair showed a cutaway of one
- of the hoop-type supports
- 25 (column/beam provided by Sprung).

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1	The Chair noted that in order to
2	compare competing quotes and
3	technologies, the amenities' square
4	footage and physical layout needed
5	to be included. It is expected that
6	the struc structure to cover the
7	Centennial Pool would be
8	approximately 120 feet x 140. The
9	Chair also described the ice pad
10	buildings, as well as amenities that
11	will be included in those and how
12	they could be situated to preserve
13	the two better ball diamonds.
14	Sprung buildings can attain
15	equivalent to LEED silver standard
16	certification, but will not be
17	certified as the process and
18	attributed costs cannot be
19	justified. Even with the inclusion
20	of skylights, the R-value of the
21	roof portion remains at 22. In
22	response to Bill's concern, the
23	Chair confirmed that it is the
24	responsibility of the local
25	contractor's engineer to certify the

- 1 building. The Tedlar membrane is
- 2 virtually indestructible and any
- 3 repairs are virtually undetectable
- 4 within one (1) week of repair."
- 5 First of all, do you remember being at
- 6 this department heads' meeting?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would have to
- 8 say no, I really don't remember it, but I was there.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember,
- 10 more generally, Mr. Houghton providing information
- 11 along these lines to the department heads before
- 12 Council made its decision to proceed with Sprung on
- 13 August 27th?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know why Mr.
- 16 Houghton provided the department heads with this
- 17 information about the Sprung buildings before Council
- 18 voted to proceed with those buildings?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We're not aware of
- 21 any records that indicate that department heads were
- 22 provided with similar kind of information about the
- 23 other construction types that staff was looking into
- 24 for the arena.
- Do you know if Mr. Houghton or anyone

- 1 provided information of this level of detail to the
- 2 department heads about the other construction types
- 3 that staff was examining?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would have to
- 5 say no.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 7 concern at the time that the Town wasn't giving equal
- 8 consideration to the different construction types that
- 9 Council had instructed it to look into?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can you explain to
- 12 me what you were concerned about?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In terms of what
- 14 Council asked us to do in -- with regard to the arena
- 15 in particular, I didn't -- I didn't have the same
- 16 level of information regarding the three (3) different
- 17 types of buildings that they were supposed to look at,
- 18 and in the end it turned out that we are only looking
- 19 at two (2) different types of buildings, a pre-
- 20 engineered structure and a fabric building.
- 21 The bricks and mortar one seemed to
- 22 have been dropped earlier on. That would have been my
- 23 -- my main concern.
- 24 The direction was actually that it was
- 25 a fabric building that would go over the pool, so to

- 1 me it was just a determination of which manufacturer
- 2 you -- you chose, but we were not giving the same type
- 3 of information regarding the arena. And even at this
- 4 point, it -- it -- it was heavily weighted towards
- 5 Sprung.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You noted that when
- 7 you did some internet research, you identified two (2)
- 8 other fabric building suppliers.
- 9 Do you know if department heads were
- 10 ever provided with any information about what those
- 11 companies were offering?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 13 there were.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: The concerns that
- 15 you outlined to us, did you speak to anybody about
- 16 them before Council voted to proceed with Sprung on
- 17 August 27th?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 19 so.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Any reason why not?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believed that
- 22 this -- the Purchasing Manager and the CAO that were
- 23 in charge of the process were the ones that were
- 24 dealing with the way things were going to go, and
- 25 talking about that, my concerns would have just been

- 1 wasted air.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: You felt that they
- 3 wouldn't be taken seriously or listened to?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And is that the
- 6 reason that you didn't raise them with those two (2)?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Why would you
- 9 believe that Mr. McNalty wouldn't take your concern
- 10 seriously?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Because he was -
- 12 he reported directly to the CAO, and due to -- had
- 13 he taken them even -- let me start over. Even if he
- 14 had taken them seriously, I believe that they would
- 15 have been overruled.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I want to ask you
- 17 some questions about the work that WGD Architects was
- 18 doing for the Town.
- 19 Could we turn to paragraph 6 of Summary
- 20 Document 2-4?
- 21
- 22 (BRIEF PAUSE)
- 23
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This paragraph and
- 25 -- and the paragraphs that follow describe

- 1 instructions that Mr. McNalty ultimately provides to
- 2 WGD in terms of the feasibility study that they were
- 3 doing on the arena with respect to -- the Town was
- 4 doing to get ready for the staff report.
- 5 If we can turn up TOC188041.1.1.

6

7 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This is the
- 10 feasibility study document that Mr. McNalty provided
- 11 to WGD at the beginning of the work that it was doing
- 12 for the Town. And if we could scroll down to page 2,
- 13 there it lays out Terms of Reference here. If you
- 14 scroll down to the last paragraph, it says:
- 15 "The following scenarios are to be
- 16 considered as a minimum.
- 17 Alternatives may be provided should
- they enhance the opportunity for
- 19 part of the project to go forward."
- And scroll down to the next page.
- 21 Scroll a bit so we can see the heading.
- This lists the four (4) things that WGD
- 23 is being asked to consider at a minimum, and I'm
- 24 particularly interested in the middle two (2), the
- 25 initial phase of a single-pad arena and a stand-alone

1 single pad arena with the potential to twin in the

- 2 future.
- 3 If you look in the columns underneath
- 4 those two (2) headings, in both instances WGD is being
- 5 asked to consider a fabric membrane over a new ice
- 6 arena, the Sprung or equivalent.
- 7 Were you aware that WGD had been asked
- 8 to -- to provide information and estimates with
- 9 respect to a fabric membrane building over the -- and
- 10 arena and a fabric membrane building?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall
- 12 if I was aware or not.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: In terms of the
- 14 nature of the work that WGD was doing for the Town, I
- 15 think you told us that you knew that they were looking
- 16 at building types for the arena. Have I got that
- 17 right?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I believe
- 19 so, yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 21 what kinds of building types you thought they were
- 22 looking at?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I thought they
- 24 were looking at the bricks and mortar and a pre-
- 25 engineered steel structure, and I don't -- I don't

- 1 recall if the fabric structure was involved or not.
- 2 But they -- they did do an assessment
- 3 of the Eddie Bush arena prior to the steering
- 4 committee job.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you think that
- 6 in the work that WGD was doing for the Town, it was
- 7 trying to bid for a contract with the Town to
- 8 construct recreational facilities?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What did you think
- 11 they were doing?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In a -- in a lot
- 13 of instances we do hire consultants to do feasibility
- 14 studies, and as well then to write specifications for
- 15 RFPs, and I thought that that's where it would be
- 16 leading.

17

18 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Could we go to --
- 21 go to paragraph 269 on the Foundation Document,
- 22 please.
- This paragraph describes that on July
- 24 24th, 2012 WGD sent Mr. McNalty architectural
- 25 drawings, which they described as the current concept

- 1 for a single pad arena.
- 2 The drawings included drawing for a
- 3 pre-eng structure and for a Sprung structure. This is
- 4 sent to Mr. McNalty. Do you remember if you received
- 5 drawing for a pre-eng structure and a Sprung structure
- 6 that WGD had put together?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I don't
- 8 recall.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Could we scroll
- 10 down to paragraph 270 of the Foundation Document?
- 11 So later in the day, on July 24th, you
- 12 sent an email to the EMC and Mr. McNalty. In your
- 13 email you state that you had asked him to continue to
- 14 work with WGD on a list of items, including redrawing
- 15 certain parts of the schematics and providing pricing
- 16 for both a pre-fabricated steel structure and a bricks
- 17 and mortar building.
- 18 With respect to Sprung, you stated:
- 19 "Leave the Sprung building pricing
- for now until the management team
- 21 and Dave McNalty can meet with the
- 22 Sprung people. Once we have the
- 23 pricing on operating costs for the
- 24 buildings from WGD, somebody (Ed,
- Dave, Dave and the management team)

143 1 will contact Sprung to get pricing 2 to ensure that we are comparing 3 apples to apples." So, do you remember sending this email? 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, but I apparently did. 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: My next question was going to be: Do you know what led to you sending this email, why you sent this? 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I do not. 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: More generally, do you remember if you ever turned your mind to asking 13 WGD not to look at a fabric building? That staff will be doing that through Sprung instead? 14 15 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I actually did not have direct contact with WGD, so I did not ask them anything. 17 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And this email that 19 you sent to Mr. McNalty, you're providing him with instructions on what he is to do with WGD. 20 21 One (1) of the things you ask him to have them do is provide pricing for both the pre-22 23 fabricated steel structure and a bricks and mortar 24 building. 2.5 Do you remember if it was your

- 1 intention or if you were asking Mr. McNalty to have
- 2 WGD not look at a fabric building?
- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 4 it was my intention not to have them look at a fabric
- 5 building, because they are -- they are architects and
- 6 they did know what had been planned for the Central
- 7 Park Steering Committee.
- 8 I would think that the bricks and
- 9 mortar building and the pre-engineered steel structure
- 10 would have been more up their line of business.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Are you able to
- 12 help us understand why somebody, Ed, Dave, Dave, and
- 13 the management team, would contact Sprung to get
- 14 prices after the Town had received prices from WGD?
- 15 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Other than --
- 16 well, and obviously it would be before I thought that
- 17 -- before Ed said that he would be the one (1)
- 18 negotiating if I had thought that it was going to be
- 19 the management team or -- or the other members that
- 20 were working on it.
- 21 At this point in time I don't remember,
- 22 I'm sorry.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: When you say this
- 24 was before Ed told you that he would be the one (1)
- 25 negotiating, what are you referring to?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: With the Sprung
- 2 contract or Sprung pricing, it must have been before I
- 3 knew that Ed was going to be the sole contact to
- 4 Sprung.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 6 you had any understanding at this point in time why
- 7 anyone from staff would be getting pricing from a
- 8 specific building manufacturer, where you're just
- 9 receiving estimates on other construction types for
- 10 the different buildings the Town is looking at?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The -- I -- I
- 12 had assumed wrongly, apparently, that it would be
- 13 estimates as well that we would be getting, so you
- 14 could -- Council could have information in order to
- 15 make a final decision and give us direction.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you have any
- 17 thought about why the Town would go to a specific
- 18 supplier for estimates of one (1) kind of building and
- 19 have a consulting architect provide estimates for two
- 20 (2) different construction types of buildings.
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: At the time did you
- 23 think about that at all?
- 24 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 25 I did think about it at the time.

1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could go to

- 2 paragraph 45 of summary document 2-4.
- 3 This paragraph describes that WGD set
- 4 what we understand is its final report to Ms. Proctor
- 5 at 4:23 p.m. on August 17th, 2012. And Ms. Proctor
- 6 forwards this information to Mr. Houghton, yourself,
- 7 and Ms. Almas shortly after that, and around 5:00 p.m.
- 8 writing:
- 9 "Please find attached a revised
- 10 package with the information
- 11 compiled into one report. I believe
- 12 the only piece we are now awaiting
- is the estimated operating costs."
- 14 Do you remember receiving the WGD
- 15 report before you circulated your first draft of the
- 16 staff report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't
- 18 remember receiving it before.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember if
- 20 you reviewed it at any point before the staff report
- 21 was finalized?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I may have
- 23 looked at it, but I relied on Dave McNalty and the
- 24 people that knew the engineering and that to provide
- 25 the information to me.

- I could look at the numbers and say
- 2 yeah, there's four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000)
- 3 difference. What does that translate into in
- 4 operating costs? At this point I don't have the
- 5 information to figure that out.
- I mean, you know, in -- in terms of the
- 7 quality of the building or the -- you know,
- 8 engineering architecture structure, that's not my
- 9 forte.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said you -- you
- 11 relied on Dave McNalty and others to look at the
- 12 report for you.
- 13 Who else did you rely on to look at
- 14 this report for you?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Actually, the
- 16 CAO, Ed. He had a lot more experience in construction
- 17 contracts in -- in terms of, for instance, he oversaw
- 18 the building, the water treatment plant construction
- 19 and -- and selections there.
- So he definitely knew more about
- 21 buildings than me.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than Mr.
- 23 McNalty and Mr. Houghton, did you rely on anybody else
- 24 to review the WGD report and provide you with
- 25 information about its contents?

148 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: 1 No. 2 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said that you could look at the numbers. Do you re -- recall if you 4 did look at the numbers before the staff report was finalized? 5 6 (BRIEF PAUSE) 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I must have, but I can't -- I can't specifically cral --10 11 recall when I actually did. MS. KATE MCGRANN: You had mentioned 12 13 earlier that there was -- originally, staff were 14 investigating through WGD a bricks and mortar 15 building, and that dropped off. 16 How did that construction type come to drop off the list of options that staff was looking 17 18 into? 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall 20 how it fell off the -- the table. 21 22 (BRIEF PAUSE) 23 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall 25 realizing at some point in time that that was an

- 1 option that you weren't getting infor -- any
- 2 information about?
- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Sometime between
- 4 the first and third draft of my staff report --
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You realized that
- 6 you weren't --
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: -- that I
- 8 wasn't.
- 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- getting
- 10 information about bricks and mortar?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you take any
- 13 steps to follow up on that information?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't recall,
- 15 but I would have asked the question as to what
- 16 happened to the bricks and mortar. And I would have
- 17 received an answer, but, again, I can't -- I can't
- 18 recall that.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall
- 20 learning at any point in time that WGD had provided an
- 21 estimate for a fabric building?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I remember
- 23 seeing the -- the emails back and forth, but I don't
- 24 know if that was via the Foundation Document. But
- 25 there were emails where Ed had asked Dave to supply

- 1 WGD with more information in terms of looking at the
- 2 Sprung building because of the insulation.
- 3 And I believe Dave sent information off
- 4 to them saying that, you know, it wasn't -- it wasn't
- 5 just your cover-the-sandpile-worth of fabric
- 6 structure, it was actually a more stable structure
- 7 than that.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Just so that I am
- 9 clear, are you recounting for us now things that you
- 10 remember receiving in the Foundation Document or
- 11 correspondence that you remember seeing at the time?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't
- 13 specifically recall the difference any more between
- 14 that and -- at the time and -- and reading it in the
- 15 Foundation Document, I'm sorry.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And it may be that
- 17 you are not able to answer this because of what you do
- 18 recall at the time, but the question I have is: If WGD
- 19 provided the Town with an estimate for a pre-
- 20 engineered building and a fabric building, why did the
- 21 Town need to go anywhere else to get estimates for a
- 22 fabric building?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't answer
- 24 that, but it would definitely be a good question.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember

- 1 hearing anything about staff having concerns about
- 2 errors in the WGD report or the contents of the report
- 3 before Council voted to proceed with Sprung on August
- 4 27th?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall
- 6 that. I don't recall that.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall any
- 8 discussions about going back to WGD to asking the --
- 9 to ask them to provide an estimate for what it would
- 10 cost to include a second floor in the arena that they
- 11 had looked at?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Again, I don't
- 13 recall, I'm sorry.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can we look at
- 15 paragraph 71 of summary document 2-4, please?

16

17 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm going to give
- 20 you some background for this paragraph. After Council
- 21 made its decision to proceed with Sprung, Mr. Houghton
- 22 sends Mr. McNalty a portion of the WGD report and
- 23 asked him to provide comments on the errors that WGD
- 24 made.
- The resulting memo is circulated by Mr.

- 1 Houghton to the mayor, members of the EMC, and Ron
- 2 Martin. And Mr. Houghton provided an explanation
- 3 which is set out below there.
- If you look at the third sentence in,
- 5 Mr. Houghton has written:
- The report is being misread mainly
- 7 because the report originally was
- 8 not comparing the proper structures
- 9 and was revised partially by staff -
- or sorry -- by WGD."
- 11 Scroll down further.
- 12 "Town staff were aware of what was
- and was not revised, but without
- 14 this knowledge, one can see how this
- 15 could be misleading."
- Do you remember having any information
- 17 before Council voted on August 27th about what was and
- 18 what was not revised in the WGD report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I -- I can't
- 20 say as I do remember that.

21

22 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can we go back to
- 25 paragraph 48 of this document, please?

1 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This is the same
- 4 day that you receive a final copy of the WGD report.
- 5 Mr. McNalty forwards the report to you and says:
- 6 "Once I digest the various pieces of
- 7 information that we receive today, I
- 8 will try to lay out a synopsis for
- 9 you."
- 10 Do you recall if Mr. McNalty did
- 11 provide you with a synopsis of what was in the WGD
- 12 report?
- 13 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe he did
- 14 with the numbers that he provided for me to include in
- 15 -- in my -- in the draft of the staff report.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: We've -- we've seen
- 17 a chart that compares numbers.
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Correct.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did he provide you
- 20 with a synopsis of the text of the report, what WGD
- 21 reported in terms of their comparison of the two (2)
- 22 different building types, things like that?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That part I
- 24 can't remember; numbers, I usually can.
- 25 MS. KATE MCGRANN: One (1) more

- 1 question to round that off. Do you remember any
- 2 discussion among staff about going back to WGD with
- 3 any questions at all about that report?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: All right. I'm
- 6 going to turn to questions about the drafting of the
- 7 staff report itself. We can see from the documents
- 8 that the Inquiry's received that you circulated drafts
- 9 of the staff report on August 18th, 19th, 20th, 21,
- 10 and 23.
- Is that consistent with what you
- 12 remember?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Pretty much,
- 14 yeah.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. If we could
- 16 look at paragraph 340 of the Foundation Document.

18 (BRIEF PAUSE)

19

- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Three forty-two,
- 21 sorry.

22

23 (BRIEF PAUSE)

24

MS. KATE MCGRANN: This paragraph

- 1 describes an email that Mr. McNalty sends to Mr.
- 2 Houghton on August 19th, so the day after you've
- 3 circulated your first draft of the staff report.
- 4 Mr. McNalty sent Mr. Houghton his
- 5 comments on the draft pool arena staff report and a
- 6 chart comparing the cost of a twin ice pad and
- 7 community centre, pre-engineered steel building, and
- 8 an insulated fabric membrane structure.
- 9 And in his email, Mr. McNalty wrote:
- 10 "There are two (2) attachments, 1) a
- 11 working spreadsheet that summarizes
- 12 the options and budget information
- we have so far."
- 14 And he gives some information about
- 15 that. And then down to paragraph 2:
- 16 "My edits to Marjory's draft staff
- 17 report so far. Look in the body of
- 18 the report. And please let me know
- if this is the direction -- if this
- 20 direction is what you intend before
- I get further along."
- 22 And he says:
- "I have not distributed this
- 24 elsewhere at this point, pending
- your approval and suggestions."

- 1 Were you aware while you were working
- 2 on the draft of the staff report that Mr. McNalty was
- 3 speaking directly to Mr. Houghton about comments that
- 4 would be provided to the staff report?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I was not.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Understanding that
- 7 you didn't know that, did you have any concerns at the
- 8 time that decisions were being made about the contents
- 9 of the staff report without your involvement?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: What can you tell
- 12 me about those concerns?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: My -- my
- 14 concerns were that it -- it was -- it would change my
- 15 train of thought in how I felt that the staff report
- 16 should have been presented to Council, and to the
- 17 public, for that matter.
- 18 I'm usually kind of -- I really like to
- 19 -- if I'm going to do something, I like to do it and
- 20 do it well and own it. People making changes to it
- 21 without my knowledge or discussion kind of take the
- 22 ownership part of it away, so that would be my main
- 23 concern.
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And did you have
- 25 any concern that that was actually happening at the

- 1 time? Were you concerned that decisions were being
- 2 made without your involvement on this report at the
- 3 time that you were working on it?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I did. But
- 5 it was assigned to me, so I continued to work on it as
- 6 I could.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was the basis
- 8 for those concerns?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Again, as I
- 10 said, it -- if -- I'd like to take ownership in it and
- 11 I don't mind adding in comments and making changes or
- 12 definite corrections, but if I'm going to present
- 13 something and -- and I -- I need to own it. People
- 14 making changes without my knowledge take away that
- 15 part of ownership.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And my fault, bad
- 17 question. What I really meant to say was why did you
- 18 think that was something that might be happening at
- 19 that time?
- 20 Like, what led you to -- to believe
- 21 that people may be making decisions that you weren't
- 22 involved in about the staff report?
- 23 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When I received
- 24 back some of the comments that were in the changes in
- 25 -- in direction in some of the areas that I saw,

- 1 that's what I felt.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Are you able to
- 3 identify for us, do you recall what comments or
- 4 changes led to you having that feeling?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- with --
- 6 without looking at the staff reports, no, I -- I
- 7 couldn't.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: But --
- 9 but is it -- if I understand you correctly, the -- the
- 10 concern is that the changes alter the report, but then
- 11 your name is still ascribed to the report as one (1)
- 12 of -- or as the author or as the person who drafted it
- 13 or -- in that fashion.
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Correct, Your
- 15 Honour.
- 16 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Puts
- 17 you in the position then of having to disavow the
- 18 whole thing or go along with it.
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Correct.
- 20
- 21 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. You've given
- 23 us some information already about the work that staff
- 24 did, to your knowledge, to look into fabric buildings.
- 25 I have a couple more questions about that, just to try

- 1 to round out my understanding.
- 2 First of all, what were your sources of
- 3 information about the products that Sprung was
- 4 offering to the Town?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It -- it was the
- 6 Sprung information package, the small presentation
- 7 that they -- they gave, plus we did have the bigger
- 8 listing or binder that you showed earlier today of all
- 9 the information that Sprung had.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you consult
- 11 their website at all?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- yes, I did.
- 13 I did go to their -- their website to see what was --
- 14 what was out there.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I understand that
- 16 at some point during the process of drafting the staff
- 17 report, you understood that Mr. Houghton was to be the
- 18 only contact with Sprung.
- 19 Did you send any questions to Sprung
- 20 through Mr. Houghton about their products?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who else on staff
- 23 was researching fabric buildings?
- 24 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I would
- 25 imagine that we all went out and took a look at fabric

- 1 buildings. I'm not -- the closest fabric building
- 2 that I knew about was the tennis dome at Blue Mountain
- 3 Village and it was an air supported structure instead
- 4 of a structural building.
- 5 There was one (1) at Pretty River
- 6 Academy, but again, I also -- it was an air supported
- 7 structure, so I went out to -- I just keyed in "fabric
- 8 building" and came up with three (3) or four (4) of
- 9 them and I'm certain that other members on staff did
- 10 the same thing.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Who was tasked with
- 12 researching other fabric buildings?
- 13 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Dave. Dave
- 14 would have been.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did he report back
- 16 to you with the findings of his research?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you follow up
- 19 with him to find out what information he had been able
- 20 to obtain about fabric buildings?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I didn't.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: How did staff
- 23 fulfill Council's direction to look into fabric
- 24 buildings?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: As I said, that

- 1 would have been a -- part of Dave's assignment on the
- 2 -- it -- working in the -- the staff report.
- 3 I could have looked at the fabric
- 4 building, but I couldn't tell you what -- what the
- 5 difference was. I'm not an engineer again, or I'm not
- 6 an architect. It's -- you know, I can tell the
- 7 difference between a Quonset hut and a fabric
- 8 building, but I have trouble otherwise determining
- 9 what's what.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay, so staff has
- 11 asked Council to go out, look into a fabric building
- 12 to cover the pool, an arena building. You're writing
- 13 the staff report.
- I understand that you don't have
- 15 construction experience, but what information did you
- 16 get from staff to allow you to write the report that
- 17 looked into a fabric building?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The information
- 19 that I did get was based on the information that we
- 20 actually received from Sprung.
- 21 Their -- because at some point in time
- 22 during the writing of that staff report, it changed
- 23 from a fabric building to an insulated architectural
- 24 membrane building. I can't remember at which time it
- 25 -- it changed.

- 1 So all the information that we received
- 2 came from Sprung and it talked about an insulated
- 3 architectural membrane building. Does that answer the
- 4 question?
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Yes, but I have a
- 6 couple more questions about that.
- 7 The information that you received from
- 8 Sprung, that you relied on to draft the staff report,
- 9 was that information only about the Sprung product or
- 10 did it purport to be information about fabric
- 11 buildings generally that were available on the market?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was Sprung.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you think that
- 14 looking at information from one (1) supplier was
- 15 enough to draft the staff report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I didn't.
- 17 But at that point in time it -- it was the information
- 18 I had and again, as I say, I -- I don't know if there
- 19 would have been a lot of difference -- differentiation
- 20 between one (1) supplier to another.
- 21 When I went out to -- to do the
- 22 research on the internet, I -- in the documentation,
- 23 the Foundation Document, there were nine (9) different
- 24 suppliers but I only found two (2).
- So if my search parameters weren't

- 1 correct, I wouldn't have known a whole lot of -- maybe
- 2 I wouldn't have known a whole lot of difference
- 3 between Sprung and whoever else was up there in that
- 4 area.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You said it was the
- 6 information that you had. Did you take any steps to
- 7 speak to the other people who are working on the staff
- 8 report to say we only have information from one (1)
- 9 company here, we need more than this?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Why not?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Because of the
- 13 time constraints, there was no way it would have been
- 14 available.
- I mean, I don't know -- had I known the
- 16 names of the other suppliers that were out there, that
- 17 are being compared in here, I would most definitely
- 18 have looked at their websites. And you know, if there
- 19 had of been something that tweaked my interest, I may
- 20 have contacted them, but I didn't have time or -- or
- 21 in-depth knowledge of engineering or architecture to
- 22 make a distinction between any of those things.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Was it the case

- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, there's
- 4 that aspect too, because I did have every intention of
- 5 running it out to the open market for -- for an RFP at
- 6 -- because I knew that there were two (2) competitors,
- 7 I didn't know how competitive they were.
- But yes, through an RFP process we
- 9 would most definitely have determined whether or not
- 10 there was something more than Sprung. But that was a
- 11 -- a basis to go ahead on.
- 12 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: So in
- 13 your mind there's at least two (2) competitors of one
- 14 form or another and it costs more than fifty thousand
- 15 dollars (\$50,000), so there's going to be an RFP?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct,
- 17 Your Honour.
- 18 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I
- 19 assume, and correct me if I'm wrong though, but I
- 20 assume that the merits of the different suppliers
- 21 would come out in the RFP process in your mind?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct,
- 23 Your Honour.

25 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Turning to some
- 2 questions about changes that were made about the pool
- 3 in the staff report.
- In the first draft that you circulated
- 5 of the staff report, so the August 8th draft, you
- 6 noted that staff cannot find any other pools of this
- 7 construction in Ontario and that staff did not
- 8 experience operating a year-round pool of this nature.
- 9 In your second draft, on August 20th,
- 10 you noted that while staff could find no other pools

- 16 did anyone on staff call anyone at -- at the pools of
- 17 this construction type in the US or elsewhere to ask
- 18 about their experience with their aquatic facilities?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I have no
- 20 knowledge of that, if they did.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Your August 20th
- 22 draft also included some language describing the
- 23 benefits of being an early adopter for new concepts

- 22 marketing course in university and these are the types
- 23 of points that came along under early adopter and the
- 24 -- the trendsetter and technically it is kind of true,
- 25 the early adopter does go through all of the -- the

- 1 problems, but in the end if the vendor wants to carry
- 2 on, he needs to babysit that first customer and keep
- 3 him happy.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than the
- 5 marketing course that you took, were you relying on
- 6 any experiences the Town had had in being an early
- 7 adopter or trendsetter?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: If we look back
- 9 to the ZeeWeed water treatment plant, we were the
- 10 first in North America to adopt that technology, and
- 11 it has treated us very well over the years.

- 14 before you adopted it, do you know?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I assumed

- 4 zamboni, the other turnkey items that we wanted. And
- 5 that's basically, to me, a one (1) column set of
- 6 numbers, maybe eight (8) or ten (10) lines.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: At this point in
- 8 time, you've circulated a couple of drafts of the
- 9 staff report, all of which contemplate going to RFP
- 10 both for the pool building and the arena.

- 5 we would have been buying it from Sprung themselves,
- 6 but we were buying it through their franchisee or
- 7 licensee.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: So is it the case
- 9 that you understood at the time that the Town was
- 10 buying from BLT and BLT was buying from Sprung,
- 11 basically?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.

- 13 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could make it
- 14 a bit smaller just to see a bit more of the document.
- So this document includes twin ice pad
- 16 and community centre budget, pre-engineered steel
- 17 budget, and an insulated fabric membrane structure
- 18 budget estimates.
- 19 Do you remember if Mr. McNalty did get
- 20 in touch with you to -- to talk through this document?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I believe
- 22 he did. And again, this is the document he was giving
- 23 on August 23rd that there really was no true time to
- 24 vet any of the numbers or the -- follow the backup
- 25 through on it.

- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I can't
- 6 recall spe -- specifically.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall if
- 8 you provided him with any instructions or directions
- 9 or suggestions about adjustments that he should make
- 10 to the information that he had available to him?
- 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I can't
- 12 recall, sorry.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Backing away from
- 14 this phone call, more generally, were you involved in
- 15 discussions or decisions about adjustments that should
- 16 be made to the estimate information that the Town had
- 17 in its possession when it was working on the staff
- 18 report?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I wonder if
- 21 -- if we could just scroll up ever so slightly so I
- 22 could see the entire chart. I can't see the bottom
- 23 numbers. Thank you.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Mr. Chenoweth, my
- 25 colleague, has scrolled down one (1) row, are you

- 1 satisfied or did you want to see the rest of the
- 2 document?
- 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I've seen
- 4 the whole thing. I'm content.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Just for the sake
- 6 of clarity, this isn't the whole document. There's --
- 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I know it's
- 8 not the whole document. But the -- the areas I was
- 9 interested in looking at, I've had an opportunity to
- 10 see as a result of it being scrolled up. Thank you.
- 11
- 12 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Turning back to the
- 14 questions that I have for you, Ms. Leonard.
- Did you have the opportunity to compare
- 16 the information that Mr. McNalty provided to you on
- 17 the morning of August 23rd to the information that the
- 18 Town had received from either BLT or WGD at this point
- 19 in time?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe when I
- 21 received this spreadsheet that no, I -- I didn't have
- 22 the time to compare those -- those numbers.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: At any point in
- 24 time before the staff report was finalized, did you
- 25 have the opportunity to compare the numbers in the

- 1 staff report to the information that the Town had
- 2 received from either BLT or WGD?
- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: For certain from
- 4 BLT, yes.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You did compare it
- 6 to the information received from BLT?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: What was in
- 8 there and what they had in the staff report, in the
- 9 final version, yes. But in terms of the WGD numbers,
- 10 no, because I hadn't had enough time to, as I say,
- 11 really vet the background information and the
- 12 assumptions that were used.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Part of why I'm
- 14 pausing is because the WGD numbers had been available
- 15 to the Town since August 17th. The BLT numbers, I
- 16 believe you received on August 22nd.
- 17 How is it the case that you had time to
- 18 compare the BLT numbers, which you only had for less
- 19 than a day, but you didn't have time to compare the
- 20 WGD numbers, which you had for quite a bit longer?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The BLT numbers
- 22 came in with blank breakdowns, they came in as a
- 23 number, 7 million and 3 million, whereas these numbers
- 24 were generated through us and through WGD so there was
- 25 more work to -- to fill the background information in

- 1 to -- to bring it up to where I could follow it
- 2 through. And I -- I was working on other things at
- 3 the same time.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: To your
- 5 understanding had anyone reviewed the work that the
- 6 Town had done to the WGD numbers?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was -- the
- 8 numbers that are here are the ones that Dave created,
- 9 so I can't -- I can't answer that question.
- I personally didn't.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was your
- 12 understanding as to why Dave created numbers using the
- 13 information he received from WGD?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 15 it had to do with the second floor mezzanine in the
- 16 arena.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: To your knowledge
- 18 did he do anything else to the WGD numbers, other than
- 19 to do with the second floor mezzanine?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not -- not that
- 21 I'm aware of. Not that I can remember anyway.
- 22 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Was --
- 23 was there a reason why Town wouldn't go back to WGD
- 24 and ask WGD to indicate what the cost would be of a
- 25 second floor mezzanine?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: From my
- 2 perspective, Your Honour, there would have been no
- 3 reason not to go back to WGD and have them do that
- 4 calculation.
- 5 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: It
- 6 just seems it might have been better than doctoring --
- 7 and I don't mean this in a pejorative way, but
- 8 doctoring up their numbers to come up with your own
- 9 number.
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would agree,
- 11 Your Honour.
- 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm about to move
- 13 on to another section, I'm wondering if now is an
- 14 appropriate time for the afternoon break?
- 15 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: We'll
- 16 take ten (10) minutes or so.

17

- 18 --- Upon recessing at 3:17 p.m.
- 19 --- Upon resuming at 3:28 p.m.

- 21 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: I'm going to take
- 23 you to your August 23rd draft of the staff report,
- 24 which is at TOC203551. Now I'm going to ask you some
- 25 questions about decisions about proceeding with an RFP

- 1 versus proceeding by sole source and the
- 2 recommendations that are made in the staff report.
- 3 This is your final draft, and the
- 4 drafts that you had done prior to this, they all
- 5 contemplated proceeding by way of an RFP.
- If we go to page 2. And scroll down.
- 7 I'm looking at the last paragraph there where it says:
- 8 "Council should be aware that there
- 9 are a limited number of suppliers
- for this type of constructed
- 11 building that would allow for year
- 12 round use."
- 13 You've given us information about the
- 14 internet research that you did and the companies that
- 15 you located.
- 16 What was the basis for the statement in
- 17 this staff report:
- 18 "Council should be aware that there
- 19 are a limited number of suppliers
- 20 for this type of constructed
- 21 building"?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Just to inform
- 23 Council that there's -- there -- there may not be a
- 24 hundred respondents to an RFP, there may be two (2) or
- 25 three (3) or five (5) or ten (10), however many

- 1 actually were out there, but that it was a limited
- 2 type of product.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And the limited
- 4 number of suppliers that you're referring to there,
- 5 did that include the suppliers you found from your own
- 6 internet research?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Those were the
- 8 only ones that I really was kind of aware of, were the
- 9 ones that I had found in my own research.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And I understand
- 11 that none of the other staff members who were working
- 12 on this with you brought you any information about --
- 13 about suppliers?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And there wasn't
- 16 any discussion about whether further research should
- 17 be done?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We've heard
- 20 evidence from Dave Barrow from BLT and Abby Stec from
- 21 Green Leaf about the possibility of a sole-source
- 22 procurement for the Town's recreation facilities was
- 23 first discussed as amongst them on July 26th, 2012.
- When do you recall the concept of a
- 25 sole-source procurement for the Town's recreation

- 1 facilities first coming out?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When I saw the
- 3 version of the staff report on August the 24th.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You don't recall
- 5 being involved in any discussions about whether sole-
- 6 source procurement was available --
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I do not.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- prior to the
- 9 August 24th draft?
- 10 Turn up TOC517069.

11

12 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This is an email
- 15 from you to Mr. McNalty and the other members of the
- 16 EMC sent at 8:27 p.m. on August 23rd. The subject
- 17 line is "Procurement Process."
- In this email you write:
- 19 "Dave, I think we have done our due
- 20 diligence for procurement purposes
- 21 already. We supplied our wish list
- to BLT/Sprung and they were aware
- that they were competing against two
- 24 (2) other forms of construction.
- Nobody possesses the Tedlar

194 1 technology and nobody else can prove 2 that they have done this type of 3 construction without collapse. Nobody else can provide the LEED 5 components in their basic construction." 6 Do you recall sending this email? MS. MARJORY LEONARD: 9 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What can you tell 10 us about what led you to sending this email? 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Shortly after eight o'clock, I received a phone call from Ed 13 Houghton and basically stated what -- what I have put into this email, con -- convincing that -- whatever we 14 15 discussed at that moment in time, it -- it convinced me to put this in an email form and send it to Dave. 17 MS. KATE MCGRANN: So a couple of 18 questions about that. 19 Could you tell us everything that you remember about the call that you received from Mr. 20 21 Houghton? 22 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Well, August the 23rd is my birthday, so I do recall it fairly well, and normally I wouldn't answer my phone after 4:30, 24 but it just happened to be sitting there on the -- the

- 1 table, and I saw that it was Ed so I answered it, and
- 2 he went over the steps that he and Dave had taken in
- 3 order to determine whether a due diligence had been
- 4 completed and over the steps -- over the lines of the
- 5 resolution that Council had -- had prepared, and it
- 6 resulted in this email.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did he explain to
- 8 you why you needed to send this email to everybody?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, he did not.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you ask him why
- 11 he was able to call and explain all this to you, he
- 12 couldn't just put it in an email to everyone that you
- 13 ended up sending this to?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: When he made this
- 16 call to you, did you understand that he was asking you
- 17 for your opinion or advice on whether the Town could
- 18 proceed by way of sole-source procurement?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: At that point, I
- 20 believed that he was convincing me that the
- 21 procurement process that they were undertaking had
- 22 been done in -- in a correct manner, and basically I
- 23 really have no idea why he asked me to send the email
- 24 when he and the Purchasing Manager were in charge of
- 25 ensuring that the purchasing bylaw, policies,

1 procedures, and quidelines were in accordance with the

- 2 Town's direction.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: But did you
- 4 understand him in this conversation to be asking you
- 5 for your advice as the Treasurer about whether or not
- 6 the Town could sole sources these buildings?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 8 so, no. I believe that he was -- he was -- the way
- 9 the conversation went and the way I feel, the
- 10 impression I had then and the impression I still have
- 11 now is that I was being told that we had done all this
- 12 and you should tell people.
- 13 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Did --
- 14 did sort of -- any warning signals kind of go off in -
- 15 in your head that the Purchasing Manager, who
- 16 doesn't report to you, has reached a conclusion --
- 17 he's not telling everybody what the conclusion is, the
- 18 person he reports to, the Town Manager, isn't telling
- 19 anybody the conclusion that they have come to, but
- 20 you, to whom they don't -- to whom actually neither of
- 21 them reports, but certainly that Mr. McNalty doesn't
- 22 report to you for -- Mr. Houghton's the Manager. They
- 23 aren't -- they don't put their name to it.
- 24 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It -- it did,
- 25 Your Honour. It did.

- 1 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN:
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: With respect to the
- 3 idea that BLT/Sprung is aware that they were competing
- 4 against two (2) other forms of construction, what did
- 5 you know about that?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Just what I was
- 7 told.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And were you told
- 9 anything more than what you've written here in this
- 10 email?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No. The point
- 12 about the Tedlar technology, that part I included in -
- 13 in the email. It was one (1) thing that I did know
- 14 that Sprung had.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What is Tedlar
- 16 technology?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It's actually
- 18 the fabric outside of -- the fabric building on the
- 19 outside. It's product that's patented by Dupont and
- 20 it's used for airplane seats, so I could -- I can
- 21 understand. Airplane seats use Tedlar. They don't
- 22 rip. I've never seen one ripped.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: How did you know
- 24 that nobody else had access to Dupont's patented
- 25 technar -- Tedlar technology?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was the
- 2 Sprung information packages.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Had you taken any
- 4 steps to confirm what the Sprung information package
- 5 said about that?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Well, I did go
- 7 out further, I think, and check because some of this
- 8 technology, the Tedlar stuff they can actually use in
- 9 solar panels as well, right, so that kind of intrigued
- 10 me.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. So you knew
- 12 that Tedlar technology was in solar panels. You had
- 13 seen Sprung sales information saying that they were
- 14 the only ones who had it.
- Did you take any steps to verify that?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Your email says:
- "Nobody else can prove that they
- 19 have done this type of construction
- 20 without collapse."
- 21 Where did you get that information
- 22 from?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That was
- 24 information that had been -- we had -- at one (1)
- 25 meeting it had been discussed, and again it's -- it's

- 1 part of Sprung's promotional materials, that they
- 2 haven't, and two (2) companies that I actually had
- 3 done -- found their names on the internet, both of
- 4 them had had a -- a collapse, so I could kind of
- 5 believe that one.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Other than the
- 7 internet research that you did that identified two (2)
- 8 other companies, do you know if staff took any other
- 9 steps to verify the statement that:
- "Nobody else can prove that they
- 11 have done this type of construction
- 12 without collapse"?
- 13 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And you write:
- "No one else -- nobody else can
- 16 provide the LEED components in their
- 17 basic construction."
- 18 What did you mean by that?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I -- I
- 20 understood that only certain components of the fabric
- 21 structure would qualify for or get us -- gain us
- 22 points towards the LEED certification. There --
- 23 there's things like recycled materials and the
- 24 aluminum structures and -- and those types of
- 25 components, would get you points toward the LEED

- 1 certification.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: What research had
- 3 staff done into whether any other suppliers of fabric
- 4 buildings -- components that would get you LEED points
- 5 at this point in time?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't know. I
- 7 -- I had done none. And if I might add, I -- I wasn't
- 8 overly taken by the LEED components. I just -- I find
- 9 that our library is a -- a LEED gold standard and --
- 10 and it's very, very expensive to operate.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Is there any reason
- 12 why you didn't add a note to this email indicating
- 13 that you had been asked to share this information by
- 14 Mr. Houghton?
- 15 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I cou -- I
- 16 couldn't recall if there was or not. I -- I do know
- 17 that I sat for a few minutes after the phone call
- 18 ended, before this was composed.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could turn up
- 20 CJI6332?
- 21
- 22 (BRIEF PAUSE)
- 23
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This is a -- a
- 25 spreadsheet containing information from Mr. Houghton's

1 phone records. I'd like to draw your attention to

- 2 line 8542.
- 3 As with the last time that we pulled up
- 4 phone records, we have confirmed that the numbers
- 5 belong to the people that we're now going to say they
- 6 belong to. We've redacted them to avoid sharing that
- 7 information, and if anybody has any concerns or
- 8 questions about the underlying information, they can
- 9 speak to us about it and we'll figure out a way to get
- 10 you what you need to review this.
- 11 This phone record, line 8542, indicates
- 12 that you received a call from Mr. Houghton at 8:12 in
- 13 the evening, and the phone lasted for six (6) minutes
- 14 and thirty-five (35) seconds, and this is the phone
- 15 call you're referring to when you say that Mr.
- 16 Houghton gave you a call.
- 17 Is that consistent with what you
- 18 remember?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you receive any
- 21 other calls from Mr. Houghton that evening?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have any
- 24 other discussions with anyone from staff about the
- 25 staff report that evening?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I did not.
- 2 I believe my sister phoned me earlier that evening,
- 3 but that's about it.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: All right. We can
- 5 take that off the screen.
- 6 Had you referenced the purchasing bylaw
- 7 or the sole-source provisions at any point before you
- 8 sent that email to Mr. McNalty?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you consult the
- 11 purchasing bylaw or the sole-source provisions at any
- 12 point before the staff report was finalized and
- 13 distributed?
- 14 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe I did
- 15 on the morning of the 24th.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. And what led
- 17 you to do that?
- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I was -- after
- 19 the Executive Management meeting, I was requested to
- 20 draft the lines of the procurement processor bylaw, or
- 21 whatever, to be included in the staff report.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. You
- 23 referenced an Executive Management Committee meeting,
- 24 and I wonder if the best way to do this is to go
- 25 through it this way.

1 So with respect to the staff report --

- 2 you don't have to tell us what else you did that
- 3 evening, but with respect to the staff report after
- 4 you sent that email to Mr. McNalty, what is the next
- 5 thing that you did?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was my
- 7 birthday, so I poured another drink.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: With respect to the
- 9 staff report?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Nothing. I did
- 11 nothing more with that.
- 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We see that Mr.
- 13 McNalty sent a draft around at quarter to 12:00 that
- 14 evening. Do you know if you reviewed that draft at
- 15 any point in time?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I never reviewed
- 17 that draft.
- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We see that Mr.
- 19 Houghton sends around a subsequent draft, around 7:30
- 20 the following morning, the morning of the 24th.
- 21 Did you review that draft?
- 22
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I reviewed that
- 24 draft very quickly before we had the -- the meeting
- 25 itself, the EMC.

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can you walk me
- 2 through what your morning looked like from the time
- 3 that you arrived at work up until the EMC meeting?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When I got to
- 5 work, I was shocked or surprised to see that Sara was
- 6 there because she was supposed to be on holidays. And
- 7 I came in the -- the back door, so I walked past her
- 8 office because my office is on the second floor here.
- 9 So, I stopped into her office. And she
- 10 said to me, well, pleasantries, I thought you were on
- 11 holidays, so on and so forth. And she said, Would you
- 12 be upset if your staff report was totally changed.
- And at that point, I said that I was
- 14 one (1) of four (4) people in a committee and, you
- 15 know, if I was the -- convinced otherwise, I -- I
- 16 basically said, you know, yeah, I would be a little
- 17 upset, but I'd have to see what the changes were.
- So, I came upstairs and printed a copy
- 19 of the report, and then went back down for the
- 20 meeting.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember at
- 22 what point the meeting was called? Like, when did you
- 23 receive an invitation to that meeting?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't
- 25 recall.

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: In the discussion
- 2 you had with Ms. Almas when you first advi -- arrived
- 3 at work, did she tell you what about your staff report
- 4 had changed?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you remember
- 7 what time the meeting -- the EMC meeting was set for?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe it was
- 9 -- it was early. I'm -- I'm usually her -- or here
- 10 early anyway. And I believe it was for 8:30, maybe
- 11 9:00.
- 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have an
- 13 opportunity to review the most recent draft of the
- 14 staff report before you went into the EMC meeting?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, the one (1)
- 16 that Ed had provided.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was your
- 18 reaction to Mr. Houghton's draft?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: As I said, I was
- 20 -- I was stunned. Regardless of what wording or what
- 21 had gone into it, we -- the portions about an RFP had
- 22 -- had been removed and it had become sole sourced.
- 23 And it -- that's really what shocked
- 24 me. Not only sole sourced, but we -- we weren't even
- 25 -- I mean, the pool was a fabric building for certain,

- 1 but then the arena was now totally a fabric building
- 2 as opposed to having Council decide what they wanted
- 3 in terms of pre-engineered or bricks and mortar or a
- 4 fabric structure there, as well.
- 5 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was discussed
- 6 at the EMC meeting?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Ed -- Ed
- 8 discussed the rationale for choosing the option that
- 9 he did for -- for going in this route, the sole
- 10 source, again, repeating the fact that we had done the
- 11 due diligence and persuading the -- I assume the other
- 12 members were being persuaded at the same time.
- I had no idea what -- what Sara and
- 14 Larry had thought of, the changes to the staff report,
- 15 but, basically, that was it, determ -- pro --
- 16 providing us with the rationale of why these changes
- 17 were made and the direction that it was going to take
- 18 when I went to Council on Monday night.
- 19 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What did he explain
- 20 the rationale was?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I can't remember
- 22 detail, like, word-for-word but it was on the basis of
- 23 the fact that the original \$35 million was an
- 24 unacceptable amount. These two (2) facilities would
- 25 answer the water and ice needs of the community for

1 years to come, they were affordable, and items along

2 those -- along those lines.

3

4 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can we pull up
- 7 CJI6146, please? This is the final staff report.
- 8 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO:
- 9 Actually, while they're pulling that up, let me...
- 10 The \$35 million multi-use facility, if you -- you did
- 11 debenture costing?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Ye -- yes, Your
- 13 Honour.
- 14 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Can
- 15 you just sort of help refre -- help me with what --
- 16 what are we talking about? If you -- if you tried to
- 17 finance it, I mean, can you -- can you just sort of
- 18 put -- just sort of tell me what that is?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: We could have --
- 20 in particular, we could have financed that at that
- 21 point in time over a forty (40) year period because
- 22 these buildings would have had a forty (40) year
- 23 lifetime. And --
- 24 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I
- 25 think the Eddie Bush is probably even older than that,

- 1 isn't it?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It was -- 1949
- 3 it was built, yeah, so.
- 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Yeah.
- 5 I -- I can remember. I have a vague memory of a young
- 6 person who played hockey in that arena. But in any
- 7 event, that's -- that's for another -- another time
- 8 and place.
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: So -- but at --
- 10 at the rates that the -- Infrastructure Ontario is our
- 11 lender of choice. We could have done a de --
- 12 debenture for anywhere between about 2.3 and 3 percent
- 13 for the -- for -- for twenty (20) years to have --
- 14 have paid for that.
- 15 It would have been -- it would have
- 16 been, I believe, about 1 1/2 million a year, plus
- 17 interest. And, again, at that point in time, if we
- 18 were paying between 2.3 and -- and 3 percent on a
- 19 loan, it means we were getting about .5 percent on our
- 20 bank account interest, so.
- 21 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: So, if
- 22 -- how do I -- how do I bring that down to something
- 23 an ordinary person understands? How do -- how do I
- 24 get from those numbers to something I could
- 25 understand?

- 1 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Okay.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well,
- 3 actually, I think I do understand you. But I'm trying
- 4 to simplify the -- the cost.
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In those days,
- 6 at that rate, a million dollars would roughly cost us,
- 7 principle and interest, about ninety-five thousand
- 8 (95,000) a year. So, if we could borrow a million
- 9 dollars and we could pay it back, about ninety-five
- 10 dollars (\$95,000) a year.
- 11 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Okay.
- 12 So --
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: So, that's
- 14 basically -- it would have been, depending on where we
- 15 would have ended up going with those funds. We did
- 16 have a small amount of other money.
- 17 In terms of the 35 million, we would
- 18 most definitely have had to get a P3 partner somewhere
- 19 along the line.
- 20 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: But as
- 21 between, say, a \$7.1 million prefabricated membrane
- 22 and a \$7.6 million pre-engineered steel building, it's
- 23 not much -- it's -- it's virtually nothing?
- 24 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That -- that
- 25 would be correct, Your Honour.

210 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 1 So, in fact, it's about the same cost? 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That would be correct, sir. 5 CONTINUED BY MS. KATE MCGRANN: 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could turn to CJI6146. Scroll to the bottom of page 2. We had looked at the statement that was in your last draft of the staff report that you circulated on August 23rd 10 11 about suppliers of fabric buildings. 12 You had said there was a limited number 13 of suppliers. This staff report says: 14 "We are only aware of one (1) 15 supplier of the type of insulated architectural membrane structure 16 17 that would allow for satisfactory 18 year-round swimming pool use." 19 Can you help me understand how the decision was made to move from the statement that you 20 had in your staff report to this statement? 21 22 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It's the change 23 from fabric structure to insulated architectural 24 membrane structure. I believe that that's what Sprung 25 was advertised as, is an insulated architectural

- 1 membrane as opposed to a fabric structure.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you have an
- 3 understanding as to what an insulated architectural
- 4 membrane was?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not -- I
- 6 shouldn't say "not." He -- Ed did have a section of
- 7 what this building would look like between the inside,
- 8 the insulation, and the outside building.
- 9 But otherwise, architectural membrane,
- 10 fabric building, I didn't see the -- I don't see the
- 11 distinction between it, but they advertise as
- 12 insulated architectural membrane.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know how
- 14 staff determined that an insulated architectural
- 15 membrane is what the Town needed?

17 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Not entirely.
- 20 But I do believe that -- well, I shouldn't say I
- 21 believe that -- that it -- it answered the needs at a
- 22 lower cost than the \$35 million or the pre-engineered
- 23 steel structure.
- 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: At this point in
- 25 time, Council had directed staff to go and pursue

- 1 investigating a single-pad arena and a fabric building
- 2 to cover the pool.
- 3 At any point after July 16th did
- 4 Council ask staff to report back on what the lowest
- 5 cost building was?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: At any point after
- 8 July 16th did Council provide staff with a list of
- 9 factors or parameters for staff to use in determining
- 10 what Council should pursue as far as a recreational
- 11 building went?
- 12 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't
- 13 believe so.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: To your knowledge,
- 15 what work had staff done to verify the statement that
- 16 they're only aware of one (1) supplier of the type of
- 17 insulated architectural membrane structure that would
- 18 allow for satisfactory year-round swimming pool use?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would assume,
- 20 and it would definitely only be an assumption, that it
- 21 was keyed into the internet to see who else popped up
- 22 with that type of structure.
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know who
- 24 directed the change of language, from fabric building
- 25 to insulated architectural membrane structure in the

- 1 staff report?
- 2 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I believe
- 3 that Dave made a change from fabric perhaps to
- 4 membrane structure. And I -- I believe that Ed had
- 5 some input into the insulated and architectural.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What's the basis
- 7 for your belief that Mr. Houghton had input into that?
- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: My basis is just
- 9 -- just a gut feel.
- 10 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Based on anything
- 11 that anyone told you or -- or discussions that you
- 12 had?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: It might come
- 14 from discussions that we had at the EMC that morning.
- 15 I'm not -- I can't verify that.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could look at
- 17 paragraph 413 of the Foundation Document. Actually,
- 18 as that's coming up, you had been describing
- 19 discussions that took place at the EMC meeting on the
- 20 morning of August 24th.
- 21 You said that Mr. Houghton discussed
- 22 the rationale. Did you have discussions about why an
- 23 RFP process would not be something that staff was
- 24 recommending to Council?
- 25 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- I can't

- 1 recall if I -- if I brought it up or not. In my mind,
- 2 it would have still been possible to have done RFPs
- 3 for -- for both and still met Council's guidelines to
- 4 provide water and ice for the community in the next
- 5 year, but I -- I don't recall if we did or not.
- 6 MS. KATE MCGRANN: "In the next year,"

- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 8 MS. KATE MCGRANN: At that point in
- 9 time, did you have any understanding that your
- 10 colleagues were looking to you as the authority on
- 11 whether or not the purchasing bylaw permitted the Town
- 12 to proceed by way of sole-source procurement for these
- 13 structures?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.

16 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: So if we could look
- 19 at paragraph 413 in the Foundation Document. This
- 20 paragraph sets out an email that you sent to Mr.
- 21 McNalty and the EMC, the subject line "Procurement
- 22 Section," at 10:46 that morning.
- 23 And you write:
- 24 "In terms of our procurement
- 25 process, staff have exercised due

I'm going to stop right there. Did you feel at that point in time that there would be no additional advantage to the Town to be gained from a tender process? 10 11 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- at that point in time, I -- I -- well, even to this day I -- I don't know if there would have been an advantage. I -13 - I can't really answer that. Without having gone 14 15 through the process, I can't answer whether or not it would have been of an advantage for us to do it. - 3 report has been publicly presented back in March.

- 6 of -- of what kind of competition might be generated
- 7 by knowing that you're up against a \$35 million

- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you recall why -
- 4 why you set out a funding scenario that involved
- 5 using the Collus funds and no other funding scenario
- 6 at this point in time?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: The reason I
- 8 included is because, when I -- I go to look at the
- 9 funding, I look at the funds that we actually do have

- 16 of -- of these rec facilities if the Collus funds were
- 17 not used?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: It's my
- 20 understanding based on the documents that the Inquiry
- 21 has received that Council doesn't ultimately make a
- 22 decision to allocate the Collus funds to the
- 23 recreational facilities until the following June, I
- 24 believe, and that as far as the Town's accounting
- 25 records went, the indication was that this would be

- 1 paid for by debenture, or at least part of it.
- 2 Have I got that right?
- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Just so that I can
- 5 be sure that I've covered this off, did you raise any
- 6 concerns with anyone about the changes that were made
- 7 by Mr. McNalty or Mr. Houghton to the staff report
- 8 before the staff report was finalized?
- 9 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 10 so.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: When Rick Lloyd was
- 12 here, he gave evidence that he believed that you would
- 13 not have changed the staff report if you didn't feel
- 14 like it was appropriate to do so, and if you thought
- 15 that changes were being made, you would have spoken up
- 16 about them.
- 17 What's your response to his evidence in
- 18 light of the changes that we've been through today?

KATE MCGRANN: This paragraph describes that Mr. Houghton is responding to an email chain, you and the rest of the EMC, forwarding an excerpt from journalist Ian Adam's blog and asking: "Can we do an estimate of the 7 losses?" 9 The excerpt from the blog that he 10 forwarded said: 11 "Does anyone realize that Council 12 has gone ahead" --13 And it goes on to make some comments 14 about what's happening. And he ends it by saying: 15 "The current operating losses for 16 the municipal pool are \$30,000 for 17 a facility that operates for three 18 (3) months of the year. Operating 19 twelve (12) months, what will the 20 operating costs be then? If the 21 question can't be answered, then 22 Council must defer it to discussion 23 until it can be answered." 24 Do you remember receiving this email 25 from Mr. Houghton and his question:

- 1 "Can we do an estimate of the
- 2 operating losses"?
- 3 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Was this something
- 5 that staff had considered before Mr. Houghton's email
- 6 that we're looking at here?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I believe that
- 8 as I said earlier that Marta's staff -- Darin and
- 9 Dennis -- had provided some operating numbers for me.
- 10 What they were, at this point, I can't remember.
- 11 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we scroll down
- 12 to paragraph 458 which is the next paragraph in the
- 13 document, you respond with a spreadsheet of Centennial
- 14 Pool historical data, and you write:

- 14 anyone on staff reviewed this chart to see if the

- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No.
- 17 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you know if
- 18 Council was advised that this chart came from Sprung?
- 19 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't recall.
- 20 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Can you see how
- 21 someone who's looking at this slide presentation may
- 22 look at this and think it was something that staff put
- 23 together as a result of the work that staff did?

- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: You can take that
- 4 off the screen. In terms of the budgets that the Town
- 5 received from BLT, what did you believe the Town had

- 8 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Again, it would
- 9 have been based on the negotiations that the CAO had
- 10 done with Sprung and BLT, trusting that the best

- 13 give you any information about what those negotiations
- 14 involved?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, he did not.

- 18 the Town did not attempt to negotiate the price or the
- 19 payment schedule for the two (2) buildings that BLT
- 20 constructed. What is your reaction to that evidence?
- 21 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I'm stunned.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: And why is that?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I would have
- 24 expected that the department head or the person in
- 25 charge would have negotiated the best possible price

- 1 and best possible outcome for the Town, the taxpayers,
- 2 the -- the community.
- 3 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was your
- 4 involvement in reviewing the construction contract
- 5 that the Town entered into with BLT?
- 6 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: My understanding
- 7 was that the CAO had forwarded it to our lawyer
- 8 John Mascarin at the time, and it came back as a
- 9 standard construction contract, and that -- I don't
- 10 recall if John noted anything in it out of the
- 11 ordinary or not.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did anyone sit down
- 13 with you and explain to you what the contract provided
- 14 for in terms of what the Town would be receiving from
- 15 BLT?
- 16 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I don't believe
- 17 so, no.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you receive --
- 19 did you review the contract before you signed it?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I -- yes, I
- 21 briefly looked over -- looked it over, yes.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Could we look at
- 23 paragraph 542 of the Foundation Document?
- 24
- 25 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 1 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This paragraph sets
- 2 out the payment schedule that was attached to the
- 3 contract. Did you review the payment schedule before
- 4 the contract was signed?
- 5 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I did look at
- 6 the payment schedule, yes.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was your
- 8 reaction to seeing the payment schedule when you
- 9 reviewed it?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: In terms of the
- 11 25 percent up-front, I knew that BLT had to purchase
- 12 the structure from -- from Sprung. But in terms of
- 13 the remaining portion of it, I was a little taken
- 14 aback. Normally, we would do it on a percentage of
- 15 completion basis for that type of deal.
- 16 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did you speak to
- 17 anybody about what you saw here versus what you were

- 2 describes June 10, 2013, meeting. Council votes to
- 3 allocate the funds from the Collus share sale. And
- 4 the minutes record that, before getting to that vote,
- 5 Council votes to waive the notice requirements of the
- 6 procedural bylaw to consider a motion with respect to
- 7 the use of the Collus funds. And then the vote is
- 8 made.
- 9 Do you know why Council did not follow
- 10 the normal notice requirements in respect of -- of
- 11 this vote at this time?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: No, I don't.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: If we could turn up
- 14 CJI11156.

16 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 18 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I understand that
- 19 this is a document that you put together?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Yes, it is.
- 21 MS. KATE MCGRANN: And I understand
- 22 that this document sets out the sources of funds that
- 23 were used to pay for the Town's recreation facilities
- 24 up to the end of December 2013. Have I got that
- 25 right?

- 3 when you put this document together?
- 4 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: June of 2018.
- 5 It was in response to a request from our current
- 6 mayor.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Do you need to make
- 8 any changes to this document or is it accurate, to the
- 9 best of your knowledge?
- 10 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: To the best of
- 11 my knowledge, it -- it's accurate.
- 12 MS. KATE MCGRANN: In presentations
- 13 that you had given to Council in 2012, there was
- 14 mention of a \$1.3 million amount from the sale of the
- 15 Poplar side road that could have been allocated to the
- 16 recreational facility construction.
- I don't see that amount here. Can you
- 18 help us understand why that amount was not put towards
- 19 the cost of the recreational facilities?
- 20 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: At the time that
- 21 we prepared the initial estimates I had anticipated
- 22 that we would receive 1 point -- we could use \$1.3
- 23 million worth of development charges towards the
- 24 costing of the Poplar side road, and then wait until
- 25 2016 when we sold it to the county to retrieve those

- 1 funds.
- But in the end, it was -- there was an
- 3 additional portion to that bypass that was completed,
- 4 so those funds still went to pay for -- for roads.
- 5 So, by the time we came to the end of the -- end of
- 6 the road, so to speak, the funds weren't there.
- 7 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Okay. It could
- 8 just be the way that it's laid out, but it looks to me
- 9 like what you've done is applied the funds that the
- 10 Town otherwise had available, and then applied the
- 11 Collus funds to cover the shortfall.
- 12 Is that the approach that was taken?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: That's correct.
- 14 That's correct, yes.
- 15 MS. KATE MCGRANN: The last thing that
- 16 I want to ask you about is the fee that BLT paid to
- 17 Green Leaf in connection with the two (2) recreation
- 18 facilities. If we could turn up paragraph 559,
- 19 please.
- 20
- 21 (BRIEF PAUSE)
- 22
- 23 MS. KATE MCGRANN: This paragraph
- 24 states that the Green Leaf bank account received a
- 25 wire transfer in the amount of seven hundred and

- 1 fifty-six thousand seven hundred and twenty-five
- 2 dollars and forty-two (756,725.42) cents from BLT on
- 3 August 31st, 2012.
- 4 When did you learn that Green Leaf had
- 5 been paid this amount in connection with the Town's
- 6 recreational facilities?
- 7 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: When the CBC
- 8 reported it on -- Dave -- Dave Seglins reported on the
- 9 CBC News. I -- I don't remember when that was, two
- 10 (2) years ago.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: What was your
- 12 reaction to learning about this payment?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Do you really
- 14 want me to tell you? I was very surprised.

16 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- 18 MS. MARJORY LEONARD: I was
- 19 gobsmacked, actually, if you want to know the truth.
- 20 It was... I'm astounded, sickened.

21

22 (BRIEF PAUSE)

- MS. KATE MCGRANN: Did it cause you
- 25 any concern --

- 1 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well,
- 2 I -- I don't think the witness needs to answer that,
- 3 or she just answered it.
- 4 MS. KATE MCGRANN: I wasn't quite
- 5 finished my question.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Oh,
- 7 all right.
- MS. KATE MCGRANN: -- about the
- 9 involvement you had had in working towards a staff
- 10 report that recommended that Council proceed with
- 11 those two (2) buildings?
- MS. MARJORY LEONARD: Most definitely,
- 13 yes.
- 14 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Those are my
- 15 questions.
- 16 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I'm
- 17 not rushing you. I think we'll start the cross-
- 18 examination tomorrow at 9:00 a.m.
- MR. RYAN BREEDON: Your Honour, I -- I
- 20 have been asked by one (1) of the membership to
- 21 inquire whether it would be possible to start at 9:30.
- 22 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: He's
- 23 not here. Nine -- 9:30's satisfactory.
- MR. RYAN BREEDON: Thank you.
- THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Ms.
