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--- Upon commencing at 9:05 a.m. 1 2 3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Good morning, everybody. 4 5 6 ED HOUGHTON, Previously Sworn 7 CONTINUED CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MR. FREDERICK 8 CHENOWETH: 9 10 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Good 11 morning, Mr. Houghton. 12 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Good morning. 13 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I'd like to 14 take you to the Council meeting of August 27, 2012. 15 You were obviously in attendance on that occasion. 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I was. 17 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 18 And can you tell me, was Tom Lloyd of Sprung in attendance on that occasion? 19 20 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, he was. 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 22 And can you tell me what, if any, presentation did Tom 23 Lloyd of Sprung make to Council on that occasion? 24 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Mr. Lloyd gave a 25 presentation on the attributes of the Spring -- Sprung

1 technology. MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And do I 2 understand that there was also a slide presentation 3 that yourself and Marjory Leonard were involved in 4 that was given at that Council meeting? 5 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 6 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And could we go to TOC0206027. 8 9 10 (BRIEF PAUSE) 11 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And is this 13 the slide presentation that -- that was given on that 14 occasion? It appears to be. 15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: 16 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. And can you tell me, was this document circulated at -17 18 - sometime prior to the August 27th Council meeting? 19 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. I circulated 20 it to the EMC. 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Yes. Could 22 we look at TOC0207570? 23 24 (BRIEF PAUSE) 25

MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 1 I'm not sure that's the document I'm looking for. Let me try 2 another one. How about TOC0205359? 3 4 5 (BRIEF PAUSE) 6 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And this appears to be an email sent by you on Monday the 27th 8 9 at 2:08 p.m., and you circulated it to Sara Almas, Marjory Leonard, Larry Irwin, and Marta Proctor. 10 11 And the attachment that's there, is 12 that the slide presentation we just looked at? 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, it is. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 15 And what is -- what is the purpose -- we can read the email. What is the purpose of circulating the slide 16 presentation at that time? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I wanted to make 19 sure that everything in the -- in that slide presentation was accurate. One can imagine with all 20 the duties I had, that this wasn't my single focus, so 21 22 I needed the eyes of the EMC, which was the intent of 23 having them, to make sure that these things were 24 correct. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right.

And did you also give some special direction to 1 Marjory Leonard in this email? 2 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I did. MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 4 5 And what was the purpose of doing that? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: My -- my intent there was that -- my understanding was Marjory was in 7 charge of procurement and finances, and that -- that 8 9 we were going to be speaking about that in the presentation, so I wanted her to look at it, be 10 11 comfortable with it, and make sure that -- if she felt 12 there was anything wrong or if there was any inaccuracies. 13 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 15 Did you both utilize the slide presentation to make your presentation on August 27th? 16 17 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I believe we did. 18 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 19 And do you have a memory of the matters that Marjory Leonard put before Council on that occasion? 20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: She did talk about the available finances, the cost of the -- the 22 23 project. She did speak about the procurement portion, 24 and I believe she spoke about debentures. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you.

And did you have occasion -- and when she spoke about 1 debentures, what -- what advice did she give the 2 Council in that respect? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I don't have a 4 5 specific recollection, but I believe that she gave 6 ranges of -- of what debentures -- costs are and interest rates and what -- what that would mean to --7 to -- to Collingwood. 8 9 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And did you 10 make a presentation on that occasion? 11 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I did. 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And what did 13 you speak of on that occasion? 14 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I talked about the 15 Central Park -- the Central Park project - the comple -- big project, talked about it only in a positive 16 sense, talked about it that -- and then started 17 18 talking about what we were doing and how we were 19 trying to ensure that whatever we -- we were doing was -- was in keeping with and sensitive to that Central 20 Park, obviously save and except for moving the pool. 21 22 But we -- we also talked about the fact 23 that potentially there was an opportunity from an 24 operational perspective to -- to potentially partner 25 with the "Y" or something like that, not -- not having

a full appreciation of the disconnect between Council 1 and the "Y" at the time. 2 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: There's some reference in some emails that I've seen through the 4 5 course of this proceeding that talk about meshing with 6 the steering committee report --MR. ED HOUGHTON: 7 That's correct. 8 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: -- idea. 9 Can you --10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That --11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: -- explain 12 to me what that concept means? 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. Again, the Central Park Steering Committee was trying to create 14 15 the hub and -- and so -- and they were talking about 16 having an ice pad, potentially a -- a twinned ice pad. 17 So what we -- and what we were trying 18 to do was save as much of the existing assets as 19 possible, so we sited it at the very southeast corner in the ball diamond that was -- was very rarely used 20 save and except for maybe catch prior to a ball game, 21 22 and we -- we created that so that it could be twinned. 23 We also -- one (1) of the big reasons 24 we went with the Sprung as well was because they told 25 it -- us it would be easily repurposed, so that --

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that enclosure could either be used in some other 1 aspect, whether it be a tennis bubble or -- or a 2 soccer pitch or whatever, I quess it may be small for 3 soccer, but those kinds of things. 4 It could be sold potentially. We felt 5 6 that that would be -- if, in fact, the community wanted to move forward with a -- the bigger scheme, 7 that that was an ample opportunity to do that, and --8 and that -- that we felt that that was probably a 9 bigger opportunity than if you were using obviously 10 11 bricks and mortar or -- or prefabricated steel. So it 12 could be then completely incorporated into one (1) 13 multi-use facility that -- that looked the same. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: When you 15 sent out your slide presentation at 2:08 on that afternoon, I have a sense there was a -- a response? 16 17 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. I believe that 18 Marta responded, made a couple little changes. 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Can we look 20 at document TOC0205388. 21 22 (BRIEF PAUSE) 23 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And is this 25 the response that you got from Marta Proctor to your

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1 2:08 email on that day? 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I believe so. 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. And did you get any other responses to your email on 4 5 that day with any corrections or thoughts or -- or 6 pointing out any errors or anything of that nature? 7 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I -- I don't believe 8 so. 9 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. And I take it obviously Collingwood Council voted on 10 11 that occasion? Yes, they did. 12 MR. ED HOUGHTON: 13 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And I think 14 we know what they voted on that day. 15 Are you able to tell me -- and we can pull it up, if you wish. Could we look at the minutes 16 of the Council meeting, CJ10008064 (sic). 17 18 COURT OPERATOR: 8064? 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 8068, I'm sorry. I may have said 4. 8068. 20 21 22 (BRIEF PAUSE) 23 24 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And can we

look down at page 3 and 4 of those minutes? Go down 1 further to the vote. 2 And the resolutions that are indicated 3 there -- can you go up a little further, if you would, 4 5 please? Thank you. Sorry, the other way down, I 6 guess. Can you -- and go a little further down. 7 Further down. 8 Can you tell me -- the resolutions that were passed on that day, are you able to advise as to 9 the vote that was cast with respect to them? 10 11 MR. ED HOUGHTON: When it came to the 12 -- the new ice pad, the -- the vote was eight (8) to 13 one (1). 14 There was a -- a motion then to defer 15 the existing outdoor pool for ninety (90) days until a professional review could be taken, and Council voted 16 eight (8) one (1) against that, and then Council voted 17 18 on the pool, and it was seven (7) to two (2). 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Very good. Thank you. 20 21 Now, could I take you to document 22 number TOC207570? 23 24 (BRIEF PAUSE) 25

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MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And this 1 appears to be an email from Sandra Cooper on the 30th 2 day of August 2012, just before noon on that day. And 3 the Mayor said: 4 5 "Deputy Mayor" --6 This appears to be an email to Marjory 7 Leonard. And the Mayor says: 8 "Deputy Mayor is stopping by my 9 office to review the Sprung 10 agreement. Can you provide them to 11 me, please?" 12 Ms. Leonard, in her testimony the other 13 day, acknowledged that there was a -- a meeting on that day around noon between the Deputy Mayor and the 14 15 Mayor to review the contract and the payment schedule. She, however, was unable to advise as to whether or 16 not she remained in attendance for that meeting. 17 18 Are you able to assist at all with 19 respect to what you recall as to whether Marjory Leonard was there on that day? 20 21 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Was -was Mr. Houghton there? 22 23 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: No, he 24 wasn't, Your Honor, but he had other conversations 25 that relate to the matter.

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15 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Oh, 1 2 okay. MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 3 4 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 5 6 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: If you could advise about that, Mr. Houghton. 7 8 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah. I was told by Mayor Cooper that she was in attendance. 9 10 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Now, I 11 understand that eventually, with respect to the 12 payment schedule, Ron Martin had a discussion with BLT 13 relating to changing the payment schedule. MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 14 15 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And could we 16 turn to TOC0511164? 17 18 (BRIEF PAUSE) 19 20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And I take it there was a proposal that was put forward by Paul 21 22 Waddell on Friday January 25th at 1:28. Could we just 23 scroll up a little bit to get to this proposal. Thank 24 you. 25 Did you come to understand that this

was a proposal that was put to Ron Martin as a result 1 of him approaching BLT with respect to the payment 2 schedule? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 4 And I 5 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 6 understand that the proposal involved changing the payment schedule from there on in to five (5) equal 7 payments, is that correct? 8 9 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 10 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And did Ron 11 Martin draw your attendance to this? Let's go back up 12 to the -- scroll up to the next email, thank you. 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, he did. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 15 And could we look then at TOC0516952. Could we go down just a little further if we would, please? 16 17 I note that there's an email from 18 Marjory Leonard January 25th at 2:25. I take it you 19 were -- you and Ron Martin were copied on that email? 20 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And she 22 indicated that she had no problem with the new 23 schedule? 24 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And I take

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it you also voiced your view with respect to that 1 2 matter? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I had no issues 4 either. 5 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And that's the email above. And so I take it that matter 6 proceeded on the basis of an amended payment schedule, 7 to a large extent, as a result of the efforts of Ron 8 Martin? 9 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Very good. 12 Thank you. 13 Now, if we could turn for a moment to 14 the matter of the Centennial Pool enhancements, and 15 I'm now talking about the warm water therapy pool. I understand that Council gave a 16 direction to staff on or about October 2nd, 2012. 17 Can 18 we turn to the minutes of that meeting, which are 19 CJT0008102. 20 Could we look at page 4 of those Council minutes, please? And again, they're minutes 21 22 of an October 1st meeting. 23 I'm looking for a reference, Mr. 24 Houghton, maybe you can assist, with respect to the 25 warm water therapy pool.

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18 1 MR. ED HOUGHTON: You may have to scroll down. 2 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right, thank you. 4 5 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Keep going, I think. 6 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: It says, Mr. Houghton, just above 4:30, where it says 7 number 4:30, is that what you were looking for? 8 9 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, thank you. 10 11 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: So there was 13 a direction from Council to staff to prepare a report with respect to including a therapeutic pool within 14 15 the Centennial Pool development? 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 17 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 18 And did staff prepare a report? 19 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And could we look very briefly at that staff report, which is 21 22 TOC0227087. 23 I note that the staff report indicates 24 that it's from the Executive Management Committee. 25 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's what it says,

1 yes. 2 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Right. Can we look at the signature page on this? And can you 3 tell me, just before we leave it, what in essence the 4 5 staff report said? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I -- I think basically what -- I don't have a complete recollection 7 8 of the staff report, but I understand that the staff report was answering the -- the request of Council to 9 have a warm water therapy pool installed at -- at the 10 11 Heritage Park Pool and -- and it had the -- I believe 12 it had the costs in the -- the impact on finances in 13 this report. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 15 Could we look at TOC0227136? 16 17 (BRIEF PAUSE) 18 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Now, this appears to be an email that was sent on the -- on the 20 day indicated, and this is an email that you sent to 21 22 Marta Proctor? 23 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: This 24 looks like it's October 10th there, Mr. Chenoweth. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: It does. Ιt

does. That's correct, Your Honour, thank you. 1 2 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And tell me 4 5 -- you indicate -- you make a suggestion: "I would suggest that you consider 6 7 that this report comes from you at 8 PRC with input from the EMC and Dave McNalty." 9 10 Can you tell the Inquiry how those 11 comments arose? Well, I believe that 12 MR. ED HOUGHTON: 13 the -- the main input on this report was from PRC and certainly less from the EMC. And so I was -- I was 14 15 just saying to me it made sense that the report come from PRC and input from us. 16 17 And -- and I just suggest a thought. 18 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Right, and 19 you say just a thought, Ed, correct? 20 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 22 Do you know if -- if the author of the 23 report or the -- the signature page were changed as a 24 result of your suggestion to Marta Proctor on that 25 occasion?

I believe it was. 1 MR. ED HOUGHTON: 2 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. And can you tell me, is it your understanding that 3 Marta Proctor circulated a draft of that staff report 4 5 regarding the therapy pool at some time? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Could we look at TOC0227852. 8 And the draft of that report appeared 9 10 to have a pretty wide circulation by Marta. And Marta is, in this email, dated the 11th day of October, 11 12 2012, is forwarding the draft report to a number of individuals. 13 14 Is there any councillors that she 15 forwards this to at this juncture? 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, she forwards it to her two (2) Council reps, Keith Hull and Dale West. 17 18 And she also forwards it to her Parks, Recreation and 19 Culture advisory committee. 20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. And did you have any thoughts with respect to this 21 22 being forwarded to the advisory committee? 23 MR. ED HOUGHTON: At that time, none. 24 Today I do, but --25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: What are

22 your thoughts on it today? 1 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Well, at the time I 2 -- again it was -- it was practice, you're bringing 3 the input from those people. I'm a little bit -- I'm 4 5 not sure about the PR -- PRCAC, but certainly from 6 Councillor Hull and Councillor West, there -- they were appointed as Council representatives. They --7 they bring the public view to these kinds of things. 8 9 They bring sometimes a different perspective that gets 10 incorporated into these. 11 And -- and I -- I -- I wouldn't have 12 had an issue because that's what, you know, 7, 8, 9, 13 10 years ago we did. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 15 Now, can you tell me she also appears to have forwarded to -- to a number of members of the public 16 who were on the PRC advisory committee? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And did you have a thought about her doing that at that time? 20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I -- I don't think I I don't think I had much of an -- I don't think 22 did. 23 I thought about it. 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 2.5 And I understand that there was eventually a Council

resolution with respect to the therapy pool --1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: -- that appears to have been at Council meeting that occurred 4 5 on October 15th, 2012. In that respect, can we look at CJ1 -- or CJI0008104? If we could look at pages 2 6 and 3 of that letter. 7 8 And just go up a little bit, if you would, please, just a slight bit. Scroll up the other 9 Thank you. Sorry, down ever so slightly. 10 Thank way. 11 you. I just want to see the vote, if we could. 12 MR. ED HOUGHTON: It's -- it --13 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Scroll up Thank you. Very good. So, I take it that there 14 now. 15 was a Council resolution to proceed ahead with the therapeutic pool on that occasion? 16 17 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 18 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And was 19 there a price that was set as an upset limit for that task? 20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: There was an upset limit set in the staff report of five hundred and 22 23 fifty thousand (550,000). 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Can you tell 25 me, what was the vote count with respect to that

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resolution? 1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Again, there was a motion to defer for thirty (30) days and try to get 3 comments about working with the YMCA because there was 4 5 some thoughts of that the YMCA may be -- may be the 6 more appropriate place for a therapeutic pool. 7 That -- that motion to defer was defeated seven (7) to two (2). And then -- and then 8 9 the original motion to move forward with the 10 therapeutic -- therapeutic pool at Centennial Park was 11 voted on and moved and seconded and approved seven (7) 12 to two (2). 13 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 14 Now, with whom did the Town contract to install the 15 therapeutic pool? 16 With whom did the Town contract with respect to the installation of the therapeutic pool? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Well, BLT was the --19 the general contractor onsite. My understanding, they qot three (3) prices from therapeu -- therapeutic pool 20 experts to install the pool, and they went with the --21 the low price. 22 23 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And did this 24 become an amendment to the existing September 30th 25 contract with -- with BLT, or do you know?

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MR. ED HOUGHTON: It would be an extra 1 2 of two (2) that contracted us --3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 4 MR. ED HOUGHTON: -- at least to the 5 project. 6 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Now, the pool enhancement, I'm interested in -- in 7 understanding how that had occasion to come about. Ι 8 understand there was a deputation to Collingwood 9 Council by the -- by the Clippers at some juncture? 10 11 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Could we turn to CJI0008047? 13 14 15 (BRIEF PAUSE) 16 17 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And can we 18 scroll down to see if we can pick up the Clippers' 19 deputation at this meeting? Go slowly, and we'll see 20 if we can pick it up. 21 22 (BRIEF PAUSE) 23 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: This would 25 appear to be it. And were you at this -- this

meeting, Mr. Houghton? 1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I was. 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Can you tell me, in essence, what the wishes were that were 4 expessed by -- expressed by the Clippers on that 5 occasion? 6 7 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I believe that the Clippers were excited that they were going to have an 8 9 opportunity -- or potentially have an opportunity for an upgraded pool that they would be able to train 10 11 their young swimmers. And they -- they, as well, 12 seemed to have an issue with the YMCA from a -- from a 13 training perspective, that they could only get certain specific hours at the YMCA, which I quess is 14 15 understanding the way they schedule things. 16 So, they had a bit of an issue with 17 that and felt that there was a greater opportunity to 18 have better training hours at this -- the -- at this 19 location at Central Park -- or at Heritage Park. 20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Was there eventually a report -- staff report that was drafted 21 22 with respect to the Centennial pool enhancements? 23 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, there was. 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 25 And just looking quickly at that, is that TOC0516920?

1 2 (BRIEF PAUSE) 3 4 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And is this 5 a staff report prepared by Marta Proctor with respect 6 to the pool enhancements? 7 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's what it appears to be, yes. 8 9 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 10 And, again, the recommendation with respect to that 11 from staff at that juncture was? 12 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That Council received the information as well as received the 13 proposed pool operating model. 14 15 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. And did Council eventually authorize the work for the 16 pool enhancement to proceed? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And can you tell me, in terms of the contracting of that work, 20 with whom was the pool enhancement contracted? 21 22 MR. ED HOUGHTON: It was in addition 23 to the -- the scope of work at Central -- at Heritage 24 Park with BLT. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And can you

28 tell me, was it regarded as a contract change, or do 1 2 you know? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I -- I don't recollect specifically how they did that. 4 5 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: But, in any 6 event, that change was approved by Council, was it? 7 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That is correct. And there was -- there was also a donat -- a large 8 9 donation given to the project by an anonymous Clipper 10 person. 11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 12 I understand that, at some juncture, the Town was 13 notified that there had been -- been some vandalism at 14 the Centennial pool? 15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 16 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And was that sometime in July of 2013, or do you know? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I think so. 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. And did -- I'm going to refer you if I could, please, 20 21 to document number TOC0345937. And if we could go down a little bit on that document, please. Scroll 22 23 down. And scroll down a little further. 24 It may be that Ron's original email is 25 there, and it is. There's an email from Ron Martin on

July 22nd. And he says: 1 "As a result of recent vandalism at 2 3 the pool, I have been asked to 4 comment on why there is no aluminum 5 shield on the building as originally 6 presented to Council." 7 And I take it there was a response by Dave Barrow to that request for information from Ron 8 Martin? 9 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Could we 12 scroll up and have a look at that, please? Thank you. 13 And we have the response from Dave Barrow with respect 14 to that requested information. 15 And you've had occasion to review this and you're familiar with it? 16 17 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 18 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 19 And could we go up to the next email? And this appears to be an email from Ron Martin to Houghton and 20 21 Leonard and Irwin on the 22nd of July, 2013: 22 "Before I send this response to 23 Council, do you all agree with 24 Dave's comments?" 25 Is the request from Ron Martin. And

did you have occasion to -- to respond to that email? 1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I didn't respond to this email. What I did was I responded to Mr. Barrow 3 and said what my recollection of the -- the discussion 4 5 was. There's a couple things that he had said in his 6 that I didn't, quite frankly, agree with and I didn't -- I just offered up what I felt was what had 7 8 happened. 9 If you could go up to my -- we did have -- and as I've already indicated, we did have an 10 11 indication about the Sprung Shield, the group was much 12 larger and what I meant was there was -- I believe the 13 Deputy Mayor was there. I believe that there was other folks from -- from Sprung that were there as 14 15 well, and that -- that we had discussed that the 16 membrane was very robust. Anyone wanting to cut into 17 it would certainly have to work at it. 18 We -- as I noted here, the -- that you 19 know -- and this was a comment that was made, if anybody wished to break into it, there's -- there's 20 other easier ways of gaining access. 21 And -- and that there was a discussion 22 23 about the cost, which was somewhat substantial. We --24 what I really didn't do as good a job on this one was 25 the fact that the Sprung folks had told us that they

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only install 5 percent -- or in 5 percent of their 1 buildings have they ever installed the Sprung Shield, 2 and if it's not in a high vandalism area, then it's 3 not money well-spent. I --4 5 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Go ahead. 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I was going to just 7 say that in the report I cut and paste -- cut and pasted one of the -- the pieces of information. 8 Actually, I didn't do it, because I didn't know how to 9 10 do it at the time, but we did it, my staff, I take 11 responsibility for it, put -- put a -- a piece in that 12 actually did say Sprung Shield. 13 But in -- in reviewing the transcript I never once mentioned Sprung Shield, not that I -- not 14 15 that I've seen anyway. 16 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 17 And --18 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Excuse 19 me, Mr. Chenoweth. What was the cost of the shield approximately? Do you remember? 20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: My -- my 22 understanding was at the time it was substantial and 23 I'm thinking they said somewhere between two fifty 24 (250) and three hundred and fifty thousand (350,000). 25 And when they said -- again, the comment was made this

isn't downtown Detroit, it really was okay, let's move 1 2 on, next topic. 3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: All right, thank you. 4 5 6 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And I take it you obviously wrote directly to Mr. Barrow at this 8 9 time? 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I -- I'm no 11 longer the -- the acting chief administrative officer. 12 I felt that I just owed it to him to say here's what 13 I'm thinking, you've been asked by the Town of Collingwood now for your input. I'm just -- I just 14 15 sent it to him saying here's what -- here's what I recollect. I didn't say change it or whatever, I just 16 -- and then I say I'm hoping that you remember my 17 18 points and you can revise your comments since this is 19 going to be an issue. 20 And with the sensitivities that have been going around with, you know, adding to the 21 therapy pool and now adding to the -- to the -- the 12 22 23 metre, 6 lane pool, all those kinds of things and the 24 issues, there was sensitivities and -- so I just felt 25 that I could give him the benefit of my memory, which

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is pretty good that, you know, he could use it, and he 1 -- and he did. 2 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: So he responded? 4 5 MR. ED HOUGHTON: He responded. He said there was many -- like, many other people --6 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Just before you continue, could we look at the document or look at 8 the response, and I'd ask us to pull up CJI0006198. 9 10 Could you go down a little further so 11 we can see the full Dave Barrow email? And it looks 12 like Dave Barrow responds directly to Ron Martin. 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, and -- and 14 where he said roughly seven (7) or eight (8) other 15 City staff members, that's not what I meant. I just 16 meant that there was -- there was a greater number of people there, I think there was only one (1) other 17 18 person, which might potentially -- well, maybe two 19 (2), Dave McNalty, potentially Dennis Seymour and the Deputy Mayor. But there -- as well as the Sprung 20 folks. 21 22 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Did you have 23 any view as to whether this correspondence by Dave 24 Barrow was more in keeping with your memory of events 25 on that occasion?

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MR. ED HOUGHTON: I don't know if I 1 was ever copied on this. 2 3 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Oh, I'm sorry. All right. 4 5 Did you become aware that -- that Dave 6 Barrow had responded? I take it you -- you learned of that in the very least in the Foundation Document? 7 I -- I found out in 8 MR. ED HOUGHTON: the Foundation Document. 9 10 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And having 11 looked at this document, do you feel that it's more 12 representative of what occurred at the meeting that 13 you recalled in relation to the Sprung Shield? 14 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Again, the seven (7) 15 or eight (8) other City staff members is not correct. The aluminum shield being a topic was correct. 16 17 At the time there was consensus and I 18 never said that, I -- I don't think I did. But there 19 was not a high vandalism area, which is correct. 20 I think it -- it really did twig him when he -- when he thought about it further because 21 there was a discussion about you could just walk to a 22 23 -- to the door and break the glass, or other ways of 24 getting in. 25 It -- the other thing that was actually

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35 discussed that day is that it's difficult to -- I 1 mean, you can put the Sprung Shield around and 2 somebody had -- had also said that you'd have to pick 3 your spot if you wanted to break through too, because 4 5 typically you're either going to be breaking into a --6 a bleacher or some other thing that might be inside, but irrespective of that, I just -- it was just a 7 memory that just came into my mind right now about 8 that discussion. 9 10 Yeah, the majority of this was -- was 11 what we -- we had talked about. The only real issue I 12 would have is the roughly seven (7) or eight (8) other 13 City staff members, because that's -- that's not 14 correct, but... 15 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Do you have -- are you able to assist the Inquiry with respect to 16 17 when you believe the discussion about Sprung Shield 18 occurred? 19 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Oh, yes, I believe it happened on the 27th of August. 20 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 27th of 22 August --23 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Of July. 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right, 25 thank you. And I think that meeting and who was at it

are before the Inquiry at this time. 1 2 And if we could move from that exchange of correspondence to the question of LEED's silver 3 certification. 4 5 And can you tell me what did you 6 understand was the LEED's opportunity that existed in the Sprung structure? 7 8 MR. ED HOUGHTON: My understanding is 9 how they portrayed this to us, was that the enclosure itself gives you a great opportunity to have this as a 10 11 LEED silver building, certified building. 12 I understood them to say was a few 13 things. The -- the R-30 insulation, the -- the air infiltration they say that there's virtually no other 14 15 building that is that air-tight. So the exchange of air would help from an energy perspective. 16 17 They talked about the interior membrane 18 and its reflectivity, if that's the right word, and 19 the ability to reduce the numbers of lights that would be required to be on. 20 21 The -- they talked about the fact that aluminum in a -- and I don't know this, I've just been 22 23 told, aluminum has a -- more number than steel. 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: In terms of 25 LEED's points, I take it?

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1 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's -- that's 2 what I understood. 3 That because of the nature of the construction the -- the least amount of construction 4 5 waste provides a point as well. 6 Now, I did hear the other day, because of the distance and I never heard that before, but --7 but that was what was my understanding. 8 9 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Can you tell 10 me -- can you tell me how -- sorry, I don't want to 11 cut off your -- your answer. Have you told me your 12 understanding? 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I was just going to say that I think I've told you my understanding, yes. 14 15 I was just going to add to -- to the fact that -- that this was for the enclosure. It had nothing to do with 16 17 anything that we were putting inside the building. 18 And again, we had just -- the community 19 had just gone through getting a LEED Gold for the library, which was expensive, as we've all now heard 20 again, and -- and it's costly to continue to monitor 21 22 and operate. 23 I mean, there's obviously -- there must 24 be benefits in the sense of energy consumption, et 25 cetera.

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But irrespective of all of that, there 1 was no desire for us to go through that. We just were 2 excited about the fact that the enclosure itself gets 3 you a long way on the path of having a LEED type 4 5 building. And -- and so that's what we were excited 6 about. 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. Now, you've told me about your understanding. Where 8 9 would you have -- where would you have come to that understanding, or how would you have come to that 10 11 understanding? 12 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I think that -- I 13 think that the Sprung people have a -- a mantra and it's -- it's about all of the -- the things that they 14 15 believe are important in their buildings, because every time you see them, they talk about the LEED, 16 they talk about, you know, 12,000 buildings in 93 17 18 countries. 19 I mean, every time you'd see them, any time they send you an email that's basically what they 20 say. So I think they have a mantra that's -- so every 21 time we have a discussion it was -- we -- we learned 22 23 about that. 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: There seems 25 to have been a number of meetings that occurred with -

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- with Sprung. We know of a July 27th you just 1 mentioned, we know of August 3rd. 2 3 Can you tell me whether that was the kind of thing that would have been discussed at those 4 5 meetings? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah, I mean, I think -- I think once we had the -- the understanding, 7 8 which we probably got very much near the beginning, 9 you know, we always had a -- there was always a comment about the LEED. 10 11 Even when I took it to -- to explain 12 the technology at one (1) of the staff department head 13 meetings, I was explaining the fact that -- that this thing, from an enclosure perspective. I even -- I 14 15 think I believe I said that we're not looking at certifying it, we're not looking at doing the things 16 17 that would be required inside the building to get to a 18 certification, but it was -- it was kind of exciting 19 to know that the enclosure could be like that. 20 And then -- and I talked about the other options for the buildings, plural, at -- at the 21 -- at Central Park for the ice pad in that same 22 23 department head meeting. 24 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Could we 25 just look very briefly at TOC0210569? And I

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understand this to have been something that was 1 forwarded in an email by Tom Lloyd? 2 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 4 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 5 And could we look at page 2 of that document? And the second last bullet in that 6 respect indicates LEED credits and certification, the 7 8 most environmentally friendly pre-engineered structure available. 9 10 Is this in keeping with -- with what 11 you heard on an ongoing basis and what the EMC heard 12 on an ongoing basis --13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: -- from 15 Sprung? 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Correct. 17 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 18 Now, turning to phone records which have been produced 19 through the course of -- of this Inquiry, the phone records appear to indicate ongoing contacts, 20 21 substantial contacts, with Mr. Bonwick from April to 22 August of -- of 2012. 23 Is that -- is that the case? 24 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right.

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And can you tell me, during that period of time, did 1 Mr. Bonwick continue to have a position with 2 PowerStream? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Mr. Bonwick was 4 5 still under contract with PowerStream until, I 6 believe, the end of the year. 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. And I take it that you were kind of straddling between 8 Collus and Collus PowerStream at that time? 9 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's correct. 11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. And did Mr. Bonwick's position with PowerStream and 12 13 later Collus PowerStream, did that occasion contacts between yourself and Mr. Bonwick? And I'm thinking of 14 15 phone contacts now. 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I'm sorry, I lost 17 your question there. 18 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Did that 19 lead to phone contacts between yourself and Mr. Bonwick? 20 21 Yes, it did. MR. ED HOUGHTON: 22 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 23 And can you tell me, on what kind of issues, what kind 24 of Collus/Collus PowerStream issues would have led to 25 contact between -- telephone contact between yourself

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and Mr. Bonwick in that period of time that I've 1 2 described? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Well, even just with the Collus Power and Collus PowerStre -- or the 4 5 PowerStream transaction there was a number of moving 6 parts. 7 Like, one (1) of the things that we were doing was we were moving towards the launch of 8 the new Collus PowerStream, which was going to be, 9 like, in the third week of August at the Mayor's golf 10 11 tournament. 12 But getting -- getting to that point 13 was there was quite a discussion because PowerStream 14 and Mr. Bonwick wanted to have a really splashy 15 launch. 16 They talked to having our trucks come down in parades down to the town hall and tents and 17 18 all those kinds of things. And we didn't want to do 19 any of that kind of stuff. We were not -- we did not want to do the splashy stuff. We didn't want to do 20 any of that. 21 22 We -- they were going to, you know, 23 have -- spend money in a different way. So, there was 24 a budget that was cut. And that budget was -- and I 25 may -- going by memory, fifty thousand dollars

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(\$50,000), or something like that, to actually do the 1 2 Collus PowerStream launch. 3 And what Collus Power staff wanted was let's not do that, let's just give the money to -- the 4 5 money that is earmarked for doing this in the budget 6 to do it, let's give it to the hospital, the Collingwood and General Marine (sic) Hospital. 7 That took quite a bit of a discussion. 8 9 The other things that we were talking 10 about was our new logo. We had to -- we had to design 11 the logo and have the logo approved. We had to -- we 12 had to talk about the -- how -- how are -- how are we 13 going to start branding this and what would be the branding and all of those and getting our vehicles 14 15 done. 16 And then, during this period of time, we were also going through the -- the OEB approval. 17 18 And so, in that, the OEB approval, there was quite a 19 few different steps. You have the interrogatories. 20 And -- and when the interrogatories 21 come in, you have to respond to the interrogatories. And -- and so, there was numbers of those kinds of 22 23 things that were happening. 24 So, there was -- there were -- and 25 then, also, which was very, very big on Mr. Bonwick's

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agenda, was future consolidation, having meetings with 1 potentially Centre Wellington, which I believe they --2 they may have had, Innisfil; trying to talk to the 3 CHEC Group to see about is there an opportunity, is --4 5 is there an opportunity to meet with Wasaga Beach and have a conversation with them and see if there's an 6 opportunity to grow and what -- and -- and you can 7 grow in a whole bunch of different ways. 8 It's not cutting them a cheque, but if 9 -- if -- the whole concept at one (1) point in time 10 11 was to become like PowerStream north. And that would be -- and that could include everything from Barrie, 12 13 which was part of PowerStream, Collingwood, Wasaga Beach, Midland, Penetang. They already had Penetang. 14 15 So, there was an opportunity to have, like, a call -- or, like, a PowerStream north, and 16 Collingwood would -- would be part of that. And that 17 18 was the opportunity to have -- have, you know, a 19 greater dividend to the municipality, greater opportunities for the customer. 20 21 And I'm a long way away from your 22 question, I know. 23 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Well, no. 24 You're giving me an answer, and I appreciate. 25 MR. ED HOUGHTON: So --

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MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 1 Go ahead. 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: So, there was -there was many moving parts. That was an extremely 3 busy time. And, again, trying to focus on all of that 4 5 and doing all of those things, at the same time, we 6 had to get the -- the contracts signed. 7 The deal closed -- not the contract signed, but the deal closed on the 31st of July. 8 9 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Yes 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: So, there was also, 11 you know, these other things that needed to get done 12 leading up to that, making sure that we had that. And 13 -- and we're also then trying to -- I was trying to -because one (1) of the things that we were supposed to 14 15 do was have the shared services agreement complete before that happened. 16 17 So, there was many discussions about 18 the shared service agreement, which was even the 19 reason I was over working now as the acting CAO as being seconded to be part of the shared services. 20 21 So, there was -- there was many, many 22 things that was going on. And Mr. Bonwick was 23 supposed to be that liaison, or whatever, between 24 Collus Power and PowerStream at the time. 25 And so, I relied on him. Staff relied

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46 on him. And so, there's many contacts. And, in 1 fairness, Mr. Bonwick's not the kind of guy that 2 writes three (3) things down and has a meeting with 3 4 you. 5 The second it comes to his mind, he 6 makes a phone call. 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Got it. 8 MR. ED HOUGHTON: And those phone calls could either be thirty (30) seconds or twenty 9 (20) minutes, but that's the nature. 10 11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 12 You've told us of the Collus/Collus PowerStream issues 13 that would have had yourself and Mr. Bonwick in 14 telephone conversations. 15 Were there issues aside of Collus/Collus PowerStream that would have occasioned 16 telephone calls during the period April to August of 17 18 2012 between yourself and Mr. Bonwick? 19 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. There was -there was -- again, we've talked about the Mt. View 20 Hotel. The Mt. View Hotel during this period of time 21 a deal was struck to purchase. There was the due 22 diligence during that period of time. There was the 23 24 closing of that. 25 There was the meetings, potentially

talking, making sure that the ministry were onboard 1 with all of that. There was -- there was de -- these 2 was issues with Raglan Street and getting servicing 3 down Raglan Street to the Di Poce property. 4 5 There was the self-servicing issue that 6 were going on. There was -- oh, and I think the other -- the other project that Mr. Bonwick was involved 7 with was the -- the corner of Hume and Hurontario 8 which is now being developed but had been an ongoing 9 issue with -- that was owned by -- Mr. Assaf and Mr. 10 11 Strandholt was involved with that, so. 12 And -- and then even from a personal 13 perspective, I was part of the Osprey Snow Hawks and -- and so there was interactions, not that you care 14 15 about the Osprey Snow Hawks. 16 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: You've given us quite a litany of -- of things that would have led 17 18 to phone calls between yourself and Mr. Bonwick. Ι 19 thank you for that. 20 With respect to Deputy Mayor Lloyd in or about the -- the same period, was there occasion to 21 22 have frequent calls with Deputy Mayor Lloyd? 23 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah. I mean, there 24 always was opportunity with -- well, there was always 25 opportunity with both Mr. Bonwick and Mr. -- and

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Deputy Mayor Lloyd. 1 2 But with -- from this perspective, obviously Rick was very much intrigued and excited and 3 involved with -- with the project that we were just 4 5 talking about, the recreation facilities. 6 But, also, as our chair of Public Works, he would -- he would call often about different 7 things. But because there was significant noise going 8 on about -- about the recreation facilities and 9 whether we -- whether Council was going down the wrong 10 11 path, there was -- you know, the -- there always is 12 that sort of vocal, I'll say, minority of people, 13 that, you know, Rick would hear something, he'd call me, he would tell or we'd discuss it, those kinds of 14 15 things. 16 So, yeah, there was -- I mean, I -- I don't know if -- if things stepped up during that 17 18 period of time, but certainly we -- we spoke often. 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. Moving now to other matters. And thank you very much 20 21 for that. 22 I recall yesterday that there was some 23 questions from Mr. Mather to Mr. John Scott with 24 respect to metadata and the name Ed that had arisen 25 with respect to metadata. I want to see if we can get

1 to the bottom of that. 2 And do you recall that you and I would have been at my home in Collingwood on the evening of 3 October 7th to work on matters related to this 4 5 Inquiry? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, every night. MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 7 Thank you. And do you recall that -- that we received a call from 8 9 John Scott on that evening? 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah, first, you --11 first, you texted him. And then he called, yes. 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Then you. 13 And was there an interaction -- first of all, you were 14 -- you were there for that phone call? 15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, I was. 16 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. And was there an interaction in which Mr. Scott 17 18 expressed some sentiments with respect to his ability 19 to -- to format the report he was preparing? 20 MR. ED HOUGHTON: You had asked -- you had asked him if -- if you were going to see the 21 22 report. He explained that he had sent it -- or tried 23 to send it the day before, that either his brother or 24 brother-in-law had to come help him because he kind of 25 lost it and that he -- he was not very good at these

50 1 things. And -- but he said, But I did send it 2 to you this morning. And you said, Okay, well, we can 3 look for that, could you send us another copy now and 4 -- and can you send it, which he did. 5 6 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And he did that, you say? 7 8 MR. ED HOUGHTON: He sent both. Like, he had -- yeah, he had sent -- you -- you had found it 9 in the morning -- or that he had sent in the morning. 10 11 And, as well, he sent it again. 12 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And --THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 13 So --14 so, you had both copies? So, you had both emails? 15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Mr. Bon -- or Mr. Chenoweth has both copies, yes. 16 17 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: The 18 email sent in the morning --19 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah. 20 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: -- and the email that was requested? 21 22 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah. 23 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: You 24 ended up with bo -- both of them were found? 25 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Both of them have

been found. 1 2 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Okay. 3 Thank you. 4 5 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 6 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 7 And was there also an issue with respect to Mr. Scott's CV? 8 9 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 10 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And can you 11 tell me what occurred in that respect when you and I were at my home preparing for the Inquiry? 12 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Well, stepping back, we -- we did -- you did find the -- the email from 14 15 10:56. And then again, he -- Mr. Scott sent the 16 second copy, as you had suggested, to -- to have it sent, and send it to me so that I -- it wouldn't be 17 18 lost. 19 And -- and so, when you looked at it --20 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I sent it to 21 you? 22 MR. ED HOUGHTON: You sent --23 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Excuse 24 me, can I -- I'd like to hear the witness's answer 25 about this. And I -- I really don't want the

testimony interrupted. 1 2 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 3 4 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 5 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. So, let me --6 let me just step back a bit. The -- the call that we 7 had -- or that you had, and I was -- just happened to be there, you had said, John, I was -- I was hoping to 8 have seen this. 9 10 And you explained that he had had 11 difficulties the day before, but he thought he had 12 sent it in the morning. And you said, Very good, can 13 you send it right now, Mr. Houghton is here, can you send it to him because, in fairness, you and Mr. Scott 14 15 are not the -- the most computer literate. And -- and so, when we -- when you --16 we looked at the information, you said, What am I 17 18 going to do with this, because it was just basically 19 the information in the body of the -- of an email, and this isn't going to be accepted by Inquiry counsel as 20 a professional opinion. 21 22 And you said, I don't have time for 23 this -- four (4) letter word -- at this point in time 24 and my -- my back office is busy right now doing other 25 things, can we just put a cover page on this, cut and

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paste the information in. 1 I can -- I can do that. If that's 2 okay, I can do that. You said, Do not change any of 3 the words. No, I just cut and paste. So, I did that 4 5 actually sitting at your table. 6 And -- and then you said, There's no CV. We need to have his credentials. You said, Can 7 you call Mr. Scott and find out where the CV is. So, 8 I called and said, Hello, Mr. Scott, I'm calling on 9 behalf of Mr. Chenoweth, he was wondering where the CV 10 11 -- your CV is. 12 And he had said it's been forwarded --13 it was forwarded earlier, okay. So, we got the CV, cut and paste it, like, didn't -- didn't take any 14 15 words out, just pasted it into the document. 16 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: How did you get the CV? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Pardon me? 19 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: How did you get the CV? 20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: The CV had been 22 originally emailed to Mr. Brian Dempsey, and so we got 23 it from Mr. Dempsey. 24 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Okay. 25 And you cut and pasted. Did Mr. De -- how did Mr.

Dempsey get it to you? 1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I -- Mr. Scott told me that he had sent it to Mr. Dempsey. I should start 3 and say I've never met Mr. Scott before in my life. 4 I've never heard of him until now. 5 6 We -- we were trying to find an expert to be able to talk about design build. We don't have 7 -- like, the back office wasn't available -- I'm 8 virtually the back office. 9 10 So, in any event, I called Mr. Dempsey. Mr. Dempsey said I'll send it to you. I got it, put 11 12 it into the document. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Mr. --13 14 Mr. Dempsey sent you an email? 15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes, he did. 16 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: And so 17 you -- what did you do -- how did you get the information from the email into the document? 18 19 MR. ED HOUGHTON: You just cut and 20 paste. 21 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: All Okay. I -- I -- I suspected that's what you 22 right. 23 were going to say but I just wanted you to say it, so 24 \_ \_ 25 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah.

THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 1 that I know how you say that happened. 2 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. So I just -so I did -- what -- what I did was I looked at what 4 5 the OEB la -- the lady from the OEB had done, pretty 6 much the same title page. I put his -- the CV in and then I put his comments in. 7 8 I drove home. I was actually literally 9 in my driveway, and Fred called and said that we had -10 - I'd just had a conversation with -- with Mr. Scott going -- and had -- they had discussed the -- the nine 11 12 (9) bullets, and there was just -- can't actually --13 well, you had the conversation with him. I can't 14 remember what you said to me though. 15 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 16 17 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: As a result 18 of the conversation that I had with you on that 19 occasion, did I -- did I tell you that I'd had a conversation with Mr. Scott? 20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 22 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 23 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Maybe 24 we could come at it this way. As a result of the 25 conversation you had with Mr. Chenoweth, did you do

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56 something? 1 MR. ED HOUGHTON: The -- the only 2 thing I did was I think there was two (2) -- two (2)3 sentences removed based on a conversation that Mr. 4 Chenoweth and Mr. Scott had, not -- I did -- I wasn't 5 6 a party to it. 7 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Sentences were removed from what? 8 9 MR. ED HOUGHTON: One (1) of the bullets, because I think -- I don't recollect the 10 11 reason or the rationale for it. Do you? No. 12 Whatever -- they were -- I -- I believe 13 they -- there was just two (2) sentences removed. And you'll see, when you compare the two (2) of them, 14 15 there's two (2) sentences removed. 16 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: So, 17 Commissioner, can I just intervene? This is a bit odd obviously. But --18 19 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: It -yes, it is. Yes, I agree with that. It is a bit odd. 20 21 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: But I think we 22 have to have all of this correspondence produced. I 23 mean, we effectively --24 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I --25 I'll hear you on that.

1 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Okay. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 2 I'11 hear you on that. I want to hear Mr. Hought -- I want 3 to just -- I want to --4 5 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Fair enough. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 6 \_\_\_ just continue getting Mr. Houghton's explanation for 7 this so that we know exactly what it is, and then I'm 8 happy to hear about the production of the documents, 9 but I would like Mr. Houghton to have the opportunity 10 11 to finish the narrative. 12 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: I apologize, Commissioner. Go ahead. 13 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 14 So --15 all right. So you were saying there were some sentences removed from -- removed from what? 16 17 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I re -- I -- I 18 believe there was a --19 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 20 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Do you 22 remember a paragraph number? 23 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I believe it was 24 like number 4 maybe. And it had -- my recollection, 25 it had -- and I -- I don't remember, I just remember I

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1 2 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I -- I 3 think my question was --4 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Sorry. 5 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 6 removed from what? 7 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Mr. -- Mr. Scott had provided his sort of introductory comments, nine (9) 8 bullets, and then a very -- a couple of sentences at 9 the -- at the very end. 10 11 In one (1) of those bullets, I believe, 12 if I recollect correctly, it had -- it -- there was 13 something in one (1) of the bullets that had nothing to do with the -- the design build part of it, and so 14 15 if we -- if -- I believe that when Mr. Chenoweth 16 and Mr. Scott were talking about -- you know, we're 17 asking you to be an expert witness on design build, we 18 can't go into areas that you're not -- you're not an 19 expert on. 20 So what I was acting as is just sort of the back office because we didn't have anybody else to 21 22 do it, and I didn't change a word. I didn't -- and 23 quite frankly, I hadn't even read it. I just cut and 24 paste, cut and paste. It wasn't --25 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well -

59 - well, I --1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: It --3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: thought you did -- you did say that you did change --4 5 I thought you said you removed something. 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Only under direction by Mr. Scott to remove those two (2) things, via Mr. 7 8 Chenoweth's direction, yes. 9 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: So -all right. And that was from one (1) of the bullets? 10 11 MR. ED HOUGHTON: One (1) of the 12 bullets, yeah. 13 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Right. 14 And it was one (1) sentence, two (2) sentences --15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I believe it was --16 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: three (3) sentences? 17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I believe it was two 19 (2) sentences. It might have only been one (1), but I 20 \_\_\_ 21 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: And it 22 had -- like the sentences you removed had nothing to 23 do with --24 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Design build. 25 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: -- the

60 substance of -- with design build. 1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: That's -- that's --3 that was my --4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: What 5 did -- what did they have to do with? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Maybe -- it might have been -- it might have been even sole sourcing, 7 something like that. 8 9 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: So you 10 removed sentences from the report that had to do with 11 sole sourcing, two (2) or three (3) sent -- one (1) or 12 two (2) or three (3) --13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: One (1) or --14 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 15 sentences. 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: -- two (2) 17 sentences, yeah. 18 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: One 19 (1) or two (2) sentences. MR. ED HOUGHTON: Because it didn't --20 it didn't have anything to do with the design build 21 part of it, like the -- the design build concept of 22 23 it. 24 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Was 25 anything else removed from the report?

61 1 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Not -- not a 2 sentence --3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Were any other --4 5 MR. ED HOUGHTON: -- a word --THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 6 \_ \_ were any other changes made to the em -- the content 7 8 of the email that was sent by Mr. Scott other than the removal of those one (1) or two (2) sentences? 9 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Not at all. And it 11 was -- it was under the direction and the discussion 12 from Mr. Scott to Mr. Chenoweth. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I have 13 14 that. I -- I have your testimony on that. 15 I'm sorry, Mr. Chenoweth, you were asking questions. 16 17 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I'm quite 18 content, Your Honour. 19 CONTINUED BY MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: 20 21 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: As a result of -- of -- as a result of that phone call and -- did 22 23 you, sometime later that evening, forward the Scott 24 report to me? 25 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I did.

MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. 1 And did the Scott report, when you forwarded it to me, 2 have a -- a header page or a face page on it? 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: It had the -- the 4 5 page -- yes, the header page that you -- everybody has 6 seen, yes. 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: All right. And is that header page something that -- that you 8 created? 9 10 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I did. 11 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 12 And you say you forwarded it to me. 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I did. 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 15 Did you also forward it to Mr. Scott? 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Under your 17 instructions, yes. 18 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 19 And did you -- are you aware of whether that was a document that was actually served on the participants 20 in this Inquiry? 21 22 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yes. 23 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 24 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I -- I 25 think -- and I apologize for interrupting your direct

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examination. 1 2 Mr. McDowell...? 3 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Well, when you effectively ha -- and I say this with great respect to 4 5 Mr. Chenoweth, when -- when you effectively have Mr. 6 Chenoweth testifying as well as the witness, it's a pretty clear example of waiver of privilege. 7 8 So I think just to clear the air, we 9 need this correspondence produced just to see what was removed and whether it had any bearing on the 10 11 substance of the -- of the expert's testimony. 12 The other thing obviously is that the 13 report is supposed to be the report of the expert, and we heard the expert yesterday and that's all fine, but 14 15 I -- I think it's important to see just what came out 16 of the report. 17 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Let me 18 -- let me deal with the document production first. 19 What's your position producing all of the emails to which reference -- and any other 20 21 documents that have to do with this? 22 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I have -- I have no trouble producing any of the emails that Mr. 23 24 Houghton has referred to. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 25 And

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are -- are there any other documents other than emails 1 that relate to the testimony that Mr. Houghton has 2 just given about the changes that were made in Mr. 3 Scott's report? Because I want those documents 4 5 produced as well. 6 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Well, I can't think of any. 7 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 8 All And -- and if you do, I'm -- I'm -- I'm sure 9 right. you'll let us know. 10 11 Are there any other documents other 12 than the emails, Mr. Houghton, that you're aware of? 13 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Not -- no. I -- I 14 only got involved on that October the 7th and the 15 report was completed on October the 7th. I had not been involved with Mr. Scott then or since. 16 17 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I'm --18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Actually --19 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: T'm only interested in the documents --20 21 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Yeah. 22 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 23 that pertain to the alterations, changes, however you 24 want to describe it. I'm not trying to attach a 25 pejorative word to the change at this particular

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moment. I am just interested in documents that relate 1 to the changes in the report. 2 3 MR. ED HOUGHTON: The documents -only in the changes, okay. 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 5 And -and those are emails, from what I've been told. 6 7 Are there any other documents? 8 MR. ED HOUGHTON: What -- what I have, Your Honour, is the email that Mr. Chenoweth sent me. 9 I have the email that -- that -- which was the same 10 11 thing that Mr. Scott sent me. I have -- I then have 12 the email that I sent the documents back to Mr. 13 Chenoweth and Mr. Scott. Is that what you'd like? THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 14 I'd 15 like those -- I'm ordering those documents produced. 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Okay. Absolutely. 17 MS. KATE MCGRANN: If I may jump in 18 with a -- a quick clarification. I think we're 19 looking for those documents along with all of the metadata associated with them, just so --20 21 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Yes, and the metadata associated with the documents. 22 And 23 you want them in a PST format? 24 MS. KATE MCGRANN: Yes, and we can 25 speak offline with Mr. Chenoweth to help clarify that,

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66 and just also so it's clear, there is reference to 1 correspondence with Mr. Dempsey. I think that that's 2 also included in what you're asking for. 3 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: There 4 5 was -- there was an -- was --6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Dempsey. Dempsey. Yes. I can send that as --7 8 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I'm - I'm ordering the production of that -- those. 9 10 Were they emails? 11 MR. ED HOUGHTON: It was an email, 12 yes. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 13 I'm ordering -- there were no other documents passed 14 15 between Mr. Dempsey and yourself? 16 MR. ED HOUGHTON: No, absolutely not. 17 It was only to get the CV. 18 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: I'm 19 ordering the production of those emails as well. 20 MR. ED HOUGHTON: What -- I don't know 21 what metadata is. 22 MS. KATE MCGRANN: We can help you 23 understand that. And, Your Honour, just while my 24 microphone is still on, so we don't have to do this 25 again, I think our request would be any documents

related to any drafts of the report, any discussions 1 about the drafts and anything that went towards the 2 final report. 3 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Are 5 there multiple drafts of the report? 6 MR. ED HOUGHTON: No. Just the original one (1) and then just what I had on my 7 8 computer, but there was -- there was no -- no documents produced, only the one (1) document 9 produced. 10 11 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: All 12 right. So then I'll -- if I order production of any 13 drafts of the report, I -- I -- I'm not imposing a 14 burden I need to consider. So I'll order production 15 of any drafts of the report as well. 16 We'll -- we'll take a short break. 17 Give everybody a chance to digest all this, and then 18 Mr. Chenoweth then we'll return to direct examination. 19 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I can tell you, Your Honour, that I don't have any further 20 questions of this witness. 21 22 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well, 23 thank you for that. That's very helpful, and we'll 24 take the morning break now. 25 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you

I think it's 2 better and I think it's fair if we clarify all that, 3 and then proceed with the cross-examination. 4 5 If anything in the Order appears to be 6 privileged, or you think is privileged, then give it 7 up, but -- but seal it. Put it in a sealed enveloped. Then -- and then if there's any question about that --8 there may not be. 9 10 It may be that there -- there's nothing 11 in there that would properly be the subject of a 12 claim, but if somebody thought there was, then put it 13 in a sealed envelope and we'll know that that's what 14 it's about, clear? 15 Anybody want to raise anything before I 16 \_ \_ 17 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: The only 18 question that I guess emerges from this is whether 19 there's any reason to think one might have to recall the expert Mr. Scott. 20 21 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: We --22 we might have to. I -- I think until we all -- you 23 know, Mr. Houghton answered the questions. He's given 24 us his --25 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Yes.

THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 1 He's 2 explained what happened from his perspective. And once we get a chance to get all the material back and 3 take a look at it, then if somebody thinks the expert 4 5 needs to be recalled, they can raise that at that 6 time. 7 And I'll decide whether I want to recall the expert or not. It -- it may not be 8 9 necessary. It very well may not be nec -- but we can't -- we can't really do that now. 10 11 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: No, no. I 12 mean, I --13 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well, actually, you probably weren't suggesting that. But -14 15 - but I am open to recalling the expert, if circumstances require it. 16 17 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Right. I mean, 18 Commissioner, it may -- it may well be simply a matter 19 for submissions as to the weight to be attached to the expert's report. And I -- and if I had to guess, 20 that's probably where it goes. 21 22 But I just wanted to raise that 23 possibility because that occurred to me during the 24 break. THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 25 First

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of all, that very well may -- it may be the most 1 appropriate way to deal with this, is by way of 2 submissions. But -- but until we get the return and 3 everybody understands exactly in a very granular way 4 5 what we're talking about, I can't ask anybody to take 6 a position on it. I can't take a position on it 7 myself. 8 So, hopefully, we'll get all that cleared up in the returns to the production orders. 9 Everybody will know where we stand and I can hear what 10 11 you have to say on Monday morning about it. 12 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Thank you, Commissioner. 13 14 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Just two (2) 15 things. I take it you're talking about adjourning the Inquiry at this time until Monday morning? 16 17 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well, 18 I think -- I think that's -- if Mr. Houghton's going 19 to -- yes, to -- to answer your question. Mr. Houghton's going to be cross-examined and he's going 20 to -- he's going to give testimony. 21 22 While he's giving testimony, this -- we 23 -- we've done nothing to -- to run down any of this. 24 I think the fair way to do it is to let's take a look 25 at it all, everybody knows what we're talking about,

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and let's let him be cross-examined. 1 2 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: And just a -- just a sense of timing on the Orders. When might we 3 anticipate those, Your Honour? 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 5 Т 6 didn't want to serve them with the Hear -- Hearing going on. I don't like it when people do that, but 7 they're signed. And we'll give them to you right now, 8 as soon as we adjourn --9 10 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: Thank you. 11 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: -- so 12 you can see what they say. MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: The other 13 point, I quess, is that, unfortunately, I think you 14 15 have to give the witness the normal direction even in these unusual circumstances, about conferring with 16 anybody about his evidence. 17 18 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well, 19 I don't know about conferring with anybody. But, Mr. Houghton, you're under cross-examination. People 20 under cross-examination should not discuss the 21 22 evidence they've given with anyone, so that's the 23 position -- that's the position you're in. 24 It's not -- you're in the same position 25 as every other witness would be in who was subject to

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cross-examination. 1 2 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I understand that, Your -- Your Honour. Can I just make a comment? 3 4 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Yes. 5 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I can guarantee you 6 all we were trying to do was get that information to you folks for your consideration. I did not change 7 any words at all without any -- without just those two 8 (2) sentence without direction. 9 10 I didn't -- I in no way, shape, or form 11 did any of that. There was no influence on my part. 12 And, quite frankly, I've been sort of the secretary in 13 the back office for a long time because I can't afford anything else right at this point in time, so. 14 15 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Т appreciate that. And, you know, we're just trying to 16 clarify --17 18 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I --19 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: -- so that there's no confusion later on -- or out there 20 about this. And that prob -- I think the most prudent 21 22 thing to do is clarify it. And --23 MR. ED HOUGHTON: I accept that. And 24 I -- I just wanted you to know that. 25 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: No, I

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-- I appreciate your comment, I do. I do appreciate 1 it. But I think that's -- I think that's the best way 2 to -- way to do it. And, quite frankly, your comments 3 just now reinforce to my mind the wisdom of doing 4 5 that. 6 Anything else? All right. Monday ten 7 o'clock. 8 --- Upon recessing at 11:10 a.m. 9 --- Upon resuming at 11:23 a.m. 10 11 12 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: You have asked me to come back in. 13 14 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Right, and my -15 - my fault. Mr. Houghton asked me when things broke up whether or not he could speak to Mr. Chenoweth 16 about these things, and I thought that probably we 17 18 should get some direction from you, Commissioner. 19 The practical problem is that Mr. Houghton has or will get in hand an Order which says 20 21 he must do certain things, and I can see he might need some advice as to how to comply with it, so I just 22 23 thought that in the spirit of keeping the air clear, 24 we'd probably get some direction from you. 25 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: Well,

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75 it's my Order and I -- the Rules of Professional 1 Conduct, of course, bind Mr. Chenoweth, but I think I 2 can relieve against it a bit. 3 Anybody have any -- is -- is there a 4 5 prob -- what -- can you tell me what the difficulty 6 is? 7 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Well, what was raised with Commission counsel and with me was, is he 8 entitled to get advice from Mr. Chenoweth about this, 9 and frankly, I think he probably can but I didn't want 10 11 to give him legal advice. 12 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: All 13 right. 14 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: So --15 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: My --I'm -- I'm curious -- you can say anything, Mr. 16 Chenoweth, but I think to answer Mr. Houghton's 17 18 question, I would say that he -- I'm prepared to amend 19 the Order. 20 You can talk to Mr. Chenoweth for the purpose of ensuring that you comply with the Order, 21 22 and you can talk to him for the purpose of ensuring that he complies with the Order in the event that he 23 24 needs some assistance of a technical nature. 25 Is that -- that's about -- beyond that,

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Mr. Chenoweth is governed by the Rules of Professional 1 Conduct. You're about to be cross-examined and the 2 rules provide that he can't talk to you about your 3 evidence unless I relieve against it, and I'm not 4 doing that, but you can talk for the purpose of 5 ensuring compliance with the Order. 6 7 MR. FREDERICK CHENOWETH: I think that's helpful, Your Honour. Thank you. 8 9 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: All 10 right. 11 MR. WILLIAM MCDOWELL: Thank you, 12 Commissioner. 13 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: 14 Anybody else got anything? Well, thank you. 15 MR. ED HOUGHTON: Just thank you from my perspective. I -- I asked Mr. Mc -- McDowell so 16 17 that I didn't ask Mr. Chenoweth because I didn't want 18 to do something again that was --19 THE HONOURABLE FRANK MARROCCO: No. 20 It's helpful that you raised it. 21 MR.
